**WINE OF CARDON**

**VIRTUALLY MARTIAL LAW PREVAILS IN RICHMOND.**

Richmond, Va., June 25.—Street cars were run on three of the city lines after noon today and are running tonight, so far without serious molestation. On each car were four, six or eight militiamen with rifles loaded and bayonets fixed. Strong guards of militiamen were on duty at all the power houses and car barns, including the west end barn, in Henrico county. Stringent orders were issued by the authorities today with the object of maintaining order, women and children being asked to remain at home as far as possible and the troops being specifically directed to shoot promptly and to kill if necessary to prevent destruction of property or peril to life or limb.

Arrests are made on the slightest provocation and altogether what is very nearly martial law is being enforced. There were some slight outbreaks of disorder. A volley was fired over the heads of a riotous crowd by a squad of troops on a car but at 10 o'clock the cars are running over the whole extent of the several lines and no rioting of any consequence has been reported from any part of the city.

Just before midnight unknown persons in ambush, a little outside the west limits of the city opened fire on passing cars. A mobman and two soldiers were slightly wounded.

Troops and county officers are scouring the fields for the attacking individuals, and so far have made two arrests.

The cars continued their trips steadily during the night, and beyond the shooting mentioned there has been no disorder of moment. The number of passengers carried, however, is very small.

Late tonight it was reported that the bridge on which the Seven Pines line, a part of the Richmond trolley system crosses Stony Run, about a mile and a half from the city, is in flames, having been set afire, it is alleged, by strike sympathizers.

One of the men arrested in west end for firing on the cars is a former employe of the street car company. Bullets were found on his person corresponding in size to the wounds made by the shots.

**A PEN PICTURE OF NEXT DEMOCRATIC LEADER**

In the National House of Representatives.

Washington, June 29.—Some time ago I told the readers of this correspondence that I would give them a few sketches of some of the public men of the nation, whose names are seen in print almost every day, and I will begin by saying a few words concerning the Hon. John Sharp Williams of Mississippi. Mr. Williams will be the next floor leader of the democratic party in the national house of representatives, and it is well that the democrats of the country should know something of him.

Mr. Williams has been in Congress for the past ten years, but not until the past four years has he asserted himself and obtained the standing in that body that he deserves to occupy. His brilliant intellect, might not then have flashed across the horizon of the House, being a modest man, had it not been for the extremely poor leadership suffered by the democracy during that period. The leader of the minority party in the House is always the man who receives the caucus nomination for speaker by that party. That distinction, for the past four years, has been enjoyed by the Hon. James D. Richardson, of Tennessee. Mr. Richardson is a good man and one of the very best parliamentarians in the House, but he is a weak leader. He lacks political courage. When the republicans would hit the democrats over the head with a club, instead of hurling back a brick and scabbing some one's head, Mr. Richardson invariably would apologize for being on the face of the earth. This disgusted and disheartened the democrats, and we invariably got the worst of it until DeArmond of Missouri or John Sharp Williams came to the rescue and poured hot shot into the ranks of the enemy when they usually were willing to retire from the field. It was just by such spurts as this that John Sharp Williams came to be known and appreciated as one of the ablest men on the floor of the House, loved and admired by the democrats and feared and respected by the republicans. It was, therefore, with great pleasure that the majority of democrats greeted his announcement last winter that he would be a candidate for the democratic caucus nomination for Speaker when the 58th Congress assembled. It did not take long for enough members to enroll themselves under his banner to assure his nomination, and thereby make him the titular floor leader of the democrats during the life of that Congress. His leadership will put soap and vim and go into the democrats from the very outset. They will have confidence in their leader who will always confer with his colleagues. They know that when he hews out a line of policy that he seldom will make a mistake. They also know that when he gets after the republicans the latter will be very chary in their attacks on the democratic party. They have tested the steel of Mr. Williams more than once and they have no appetite for it. When in debate, with him they know that their statements must be photographic in their accuracy or they will be badly trapped before he gets through with them.

In a professional beauty contest Mr. Williams would be a selling-plater. He would not be a good hand to one side. His personal pulchritude is absolutely nil, but there is no discount on the quality of gray matter under his hat. He has a fine, well-shaped head, covered with bushy curling brown hair, a fine eye and a scraggy mustache, but his body is small and as thin as a stepchild's bread and butter. But where he defaults in comeliness of person, he makes good in intellectual brilliancy. One forgets all about the fact that he is

not a physical giant when he is on his feet, and you are listening to that well-modulated and penetrating voice and watching that long index finger which he persistently throws at the enemy. From his mouth roll chunks of wisdom and eloquence fashioned in the most exquisite English ever heard on the floor of the House. It is an intellectual treat to hear him. When he rises he can always count on a full press gallery and the clock shows always empty chairs streaming into the House, and that is the greatest compliment any member of the House can receive. In short, John Sharp Williams is an able debater, a finished orator, as true a democrat as ever marked the earth, as brave as a lion, and relentless as fate when he goes after a republican juggler with facts and figures. When he gets in action next winter there will be more republican hair sailing around the atmosphere of the House than one has seen since the days of Ben Hill, Lamar, Alex. Stephens, Sunset Cox, John Carlisle and Bill Morrison. The democracy is playing in luck this time.

**PHILADELPHIA FRAUDS.**

Recent exposures of naturalization frauds in Philadelphia have prompted the suggestion by Assistant United States District Attorney Thompson that hereafter the photographer of the newly made citizens be attached to the certificate thus establishing the question of identity beyond doubt. The Philadelphia correspondent for the Chicago Chronicle says: Outside of New York the frauds perpetrated in Philadelphia and Wilmington about a year ago were the most extensive. The great majority of those who received bogus evidence of citizenship by fraud are Italians and Armenians. It has been established that the same gang worked Philadelphia and Wilmington. Men were taken from Philadelphia to Wilmington to get their papers and return to Philadelphia to vote. Several hundred certificates obtained in this way have been picked up and destroyed and more are coming to light every day. About twenty-five arrests have been made, but some of the men were released when it was proved that they were only dupes of the men who had sold their votes. John Dillemma, alias Lemou, the alleged head of the gang, and twenty others are under indictment and more arrests are in sight.
