The Crops, the School, Organization of Christian Temperance Workers, Those Who Joined and the Officers Elected.

Crops are looking well. The farmers are not cross or morbid now at all; they got a good rain on Saturday night.

The school is still moving on nicely. There is a gradual increase in number. The teachers are sure the number will reach 100 by Monday. There are over 90 now.

Mrs. E. S. Herbert, the organizer of the Christian Temperance Workers' society, was with us on last Sunday. She is from Orangeburg.

For about an hour Mrs. Herbert sat and told us of this work, and although young, its influence is far reaching already. She is about 65 years of age, but is still going about doing good for her Master. She goes literally without scrip or purse. Her work here will be felt many years. At Tabernacle, on East Lancaster circuit, she organized a society to include this whole county. It is undenominational. Sixty-five joined at Tabernacle, but of that number were members of Bethel, Bethlehem and Hopewell churches. Mrs. Herbert spoke at Bethel in the afternoon, and 28 more joined. This makes 93, and she spoke at Hopewell on Sabbath night, when 45 joined, making a total membership of 138. Your correspondent did not get the names of those who joined at
