### TRIAL OF JAS. H. TILLMAN.

Lexington, Sept. 20—Everything now appears to be ready for the trial of James H. Tillman, who is charged with the murder of N. G. Gonzales. At the last term of court for Richland county, upon motion of counsel for the defence, the case was transferred to Lexington county. It is now eight months since the tragedy occurred, and in that time two continuances have been granted. Lexington is not accustomed to such trials as that of Tillman promises to be, and the village is already quite crowded with those interested in the case.

There are two leading hotels here and all their accommodations are already engaged. All of the counsel for Tillman are here, as follows: George W. Croft, of Aiken; Patrick H. Nelson, of Columbia; George Johnstone, of Newberry; Osmund W. Buchanan, of Winnsboro; Geo. R. Rembert, of Columbia; Efrid & Dreher, of Lexington; W. H. Sharpe, of Lexington.

Solicitor Thurmond is here and tomorrow his associates will arrive. The counsel for the prosecution are Solicitor T. Wm. Thurmond, G. Duncan Bellingier, of Columbia; Andrew Crawford, of Columbia; William Elliott, Jr., of Columbia; E. L. Asbill, of Lexington. Mr. Miller, of Lexington, was engaged for the prosecution, but died a few days ago.

Judge Gary came here on the afternoon train and is quartered at the Kamier Hotel.

There will be a great number of newspaper men here to handle the trial. The advance guard consists of Mr. E. Justice, of the New York World; Mr. Loomis, artist, for the World; Mr. Paul M. Brice, of the Record, and this correspondent. A host of other correspondents from all parts of the country have engaged quarters for the trial. The Western Union and Postal Telegraph companies have caught the spirit, and have both constructed lines into the town close to the court house, and have detailed expert men to handle the reports. Assistant Superintendent Calvert and Messrs. Webb and Rosson are here to look after the Western Union business and Manager Plowden and Messrs. Hughes and Casson are here for the Postal Telegraph Company.

Tonight the programme is for Tillman to be arranged to morrow afternoon. He may waive the arrangement, but whether he does or not Solicitor Thurmond will ask that a day be set for the trial of the case, and he will suggest a day after conference with his associates. Council will then discuss the best time to begin the case, and Judge Gary will set the day for the trial to begin; that is, if there should be no hitch or fight. Both sides announce that they are ready for trial and are anxious to get into the trial, but there seems to be an indefinable feeling that the case will not go to trial here at this term of Court.

No one can exactly say why there is this doubt as to the case going to trial after the counsel and many of the witnesses are already here, but such seems to be the case.

The accused, James, H. Tillman, is in Jail, where he is taking things easy. He has declined to have anything to say about his case at this time, but is consulting with his counsel. Mrs. James H. Tillman is here, and will remain during the trial. She visited her husband today.

cases will first be taken up and disposed of. These can be concluded in two or three days, and the request will be made that the Tillman case be set for Wednesday or Thursday of this week. Senator Tillman went to Columbia, but is expected to return here tomorrow to watch the progress of the case.

The juries for the first and second week have been drawn and announced, and are said to be very good types of a Lexington jury. The panel has been closely scrutinized and studied by counsel. The impression is that should the case be started it will take fully a week or ten days, and probably twice that time to conclude the hearing.

The effort to have a special train run from here to Columbia every day after court adjourns has not yet been successful.
