PROTECTION OF FORESTS.

J. Girvin Peters, Chief of the Office of State Cooperation in the Federal Forest Service, made an address before the state legislature last week in support of the bill for legal protection of the state's timber resources. The national government will meet the state governments in providing for protection against forest fires and offers its assistance in framing laws against the willful destruction of the timber resources. Mr. Peters made the following significant statement:

"Lumbering is the second most important industry in South Carolina. The value of its products is no less than \$15,000,000 annually. Of this sum, about \$3,000,000 represents the value of the timber before it is cut. The remainder, approximately \$12,000,000, is the cost of manufacture, which goes principally in wages to the community. This industry employs over 15,000 wage earners, many of whom are skilled laborers. As Mr. Peters points out 'It is not hard to see the fundamental importance of protecting the forests, for this means protecting the valuable timber which they yield,' but the average person loses sight of the even greater importance of protection of the lumbering industry itself, an industry in which much capital is tied up and from which so many people derive a livelihood through employment. Twelve millions of dollars are represented in the manufacture of timber products and most of this goes in wages to the citizens of the state. Without the lumbering industry or with the industry less flourishing than it now is, the opportunity of providing for the home would be greatly lessened in many communities, and much money that now comes into the state for timber products would go elsewhere.

Mr. Peters pointed out in his address how the timber supply could be saved to the state and how the industry could be made to grow at the same time. If the legislature does not see fit to make an appropriation for fire protection, it seems to us that it should at least take some step to prevent the ruthless destruction of the forests by the cutting of young trees.

We have scanned the newspaper reports of legislative activities very closely, but we have not yet seen a bill introduced to remedy the present rural police situation in this county. However, there seems to be some fear that the system will be abolished entirely. Doubtless this would be the wisest thing to do in case the delegation cannot come to some agreement upon a better plan of organization. It does seem though that the delegation could work out some plan to make the system effective as the rural police idea is a good one. As The Advertiser has said before, we believe that the only thing necessary to make the system effective is to place it under the direction of the sheriff or some officer in the county responsible for the proper execution of the law, giving him power of appointment and removal.

NEW JUDICIAL CIRCUIT.
A bill has been passed in the senate providing for the 13th judicial circuit, territory for which is to be taken from the circuit in which Greenville and Anderson are now located. The bill has not yet passed the house, but in all probability it will go through. It was introduced by Sen. Wilton H. Earle, of Greenville. The complaint is made that because of the congested docket justice is not being properly meted out, that prisoners out on bond are not brought to trial because of the constant demand for clearing the jail, and that prisoners are unjustly kept confined for long periods awaiting trial. Doubtless the conditions complained of are all true but is the

right step being taken to correct them? There is a noticeable slackness in the conduct of the courts which should be remedied before more circuits are added. Too often the time of the circuit courts are taken up with minor cases which should be handled in the lower courts and even in the more important cases much time is wasted by useless arguments of counsel and repetition of questions in cross examination. It has been estimated that it costs fifty cents a minute to run the circuit court in some counties and when such expensive machinery is in action results should be produced without loss of time. If the present methods in the conduct of the courts are to continue it is quite possible that we will soon need several additional circuits to the 13th. It does seem that some steps should be taken to make court procedure more expeditious before we add more circuits or very soon we will be unbearably burdened with court expenses.

THE CARNIVAL.

Next week we have with us a carnival, this in spite of the protests of the general public of this city. The reputation of carnival companies is not good, to say the least, but it is quite possible to have one free of gambling and immorality. The advance agent of the company coming to Laurens has brought recommendations tending to show that it is out of the ordinary run and has not the objectionable features of others. Judgment will have to be withheld, in so far as the moral effect goes, until it is seen in operation. In case the shows are clean and moral, the company has as much right here as any other class of amusement, but if there is the least tendency to transgress the laws or violate the senses of decency, police power should intervene and a stop put to the whole business. In case the officers of the law fall in their duty, then the citizens themselves should take legal steps to abate it.
