The Books of the County Treasurer will be open for the collection of State, County and Commutation Road Taxes for fiscal year, 1917, at the Treasurer's office from October 15th to December 31st, 1917. After December 31st one per cent will be added. After January 31st, two per cent will be added, and after February 28th, seven per cent will be added till the 15th day of March, 1918, when the books will be closed.

All persons owning property in more than one township are requested to call for receipts in each of the several townships in which the property is located. This is important, as additional cost and genalty may be



### BEARD CONVICTED

ON TWO OF COUNTS Abbeville Editor on Trial at Greenwood Guilty in Federal Court. Sen-

tence Reserved Pending an Apeal. Greenwood, Nov. 9.-W. P. Beard, of Abbeville, editor and publisher of The Scimitar," was found guilty here this morning on two counts of the indictment on which he was being tried, The two counts were: First, with making and conveying false reports and statements with the intent to interfere with the operation and success

of the mlitary and naval forces of the United States, and second, with an attempt to cause mutiny and disloyal-He was found not gulty on the

charge of attempting to prevent enlistment in the forces of the United States. Counsel for the defense at once gave notice of a motion for a new trial.

Judge Johnson reserved sentence pending the hearing of argument on this motion which by agreement of counsel will be heard some time next

Six speeches were made this morn-Messrs Sam Adams, T. P. Cothran and A. H. Dean of Greenville spoke for the defense, while District Attorney Thurmond and Assistants Mays and Wyche represented the government. The jury was out about an hour


