Washington, Feb. 11.—Wayne S. Bell, of Marion and Albert S. Huicks, of Branchville, respectively sergeant and private in the Twentieth Engineers, and W. J. Stuckey, of Lamar, and J. Nelson, of Scotland, both sergeants in the 100 aero squadron, were the only South Carolinians officially recorded as having been on board the Tuscania. All except Nelson have been officially reported as rescued and there is a fair chance that Nelson's name may be found on one of the lists of survivors.

To the Public: From time to time there have been requests for a statement of City Finances. Believing that a statement in narrative form will be of more assistance to the citizens of Laurens than a mere list of figures in the trial balance sheet, or statement of assets and liabilities, I submit the following gathered by myself from the books of the City of Laurens and from data furnished by Mr. Kitchens, the treasurer.

The present administration has been called upon to retire \$21,500.00 in 6 per cent bonds falling due last April, thus saving the city in annual interest \$1,470.00. We have put into permanent improvements, for material alone, not counting labor which would have been paid for anyhow as the regular city force was used, during the past twenty-two months, \$18,230.00, as follows:
