That the license fees to be paid by hawkers and peddlers doing business within the said county for and during the year A. D. 1918, be and the same are hereby fixed in the following amounts, to wit:

For foot peddlers of goods, wares and merchandise the cont of Fifteen

For peddlers of goods, wares and merchandise in two horse wagon c truck, fifty Dollars.

For peddlers of goods, wares a merchandise in one horse wage

Thirty Dollars,
Peddlers of stoves or ranges shall pay the sum of Seventy Five Dollars for the first wagon or truck, and for each additional wagon or truck oper ated by the same firm, the sum of Fifty Dollars.

Peddlers of clocks shall pay the sum of Fifty Dollars for the first wagon or truck operated, and Thirty Dollars for each additional wagon or truck

operated by the same firm.

Peddlers of lightning rods shall pay
the sum of Fifty Dollars for the first wagon or truck, and Thirty Five Dollars for each additional wagon or truck operated by the same firm.

Peddlers of spectacles shall pay the sum of Twenty Dollars.

Doddlers of Dollars.

Peddlers of sewing machines shall pay the sum of Fifty Dollars for the first wagon or track, and Thirty Dollars for each additional wagon or cruck operated by the same firm. Peddlers of planos or organs shall

Pay the sum of One Hundred and Thirty Five Dollars for each and every wagon or truck operated.

All licenses to be issued by the Clerk of Court of said County and to be of force and effect until the 31st day of December, A. D. 1918, as provided by law.


