A WORD TO THE WISE. Our attention has repeatedly been called to a grievance which our draymen and other wagoners have long suffered at the hands of the railroad employees.

The trouble is this. Wagoners who wish to cross the railway at our freight depot for the purpose of carrying freight or delivering cotton often find freight cars on the crossings and are compelled to wait an undue length of time.

The town authorities have often been called upon to open the crossings, and there have been cases in which drivers left their wagons and returned to town for policemen before they could force a passage.

The busy season will soon be upon us, and the cotton sellers will want free and open passage to the warehouses. The depot and warehouses ought to be on this side of the railroad, but they are not and we must accommodate ourselves to their present situation.

In the daily News and Courier last week appeared a glowing tribute to the memory of the late Bishop Pierce, written by a member of the editorial staff, who is indebted to Bishop Pierce for his collegiate education. Another "SHORTEST LINE" TO THE WEST.—Should an adjustment of the present difficulty be reached, and the management of the road (the Spartanburg, Union and Columbia R.R.) go back in the hands of its owners, it will make a grand opportunity for the people of Charleston, through the South Carolina Road, to step in, close the links between Alston and Columbia and Henderson and Asheville, and make a short direct line from the seaboard to the mountains.

For the Herald and News. PUBLIC ROADS.

Messrs. EDITORS: While the working of the Public Roads is being much written about, perhaps it would not be amiss to call the attention of "all whom it may concern" to two sections of the General Statutes. It seems that Grand Juries have entirely overlooked the matter.

Section 1065 on page 317 General Statutes says: The Superintendents of Highways shall cause all the roads in their respective districts to be posted and numbered, and, at each fork of said roads, a pointer to be placed declaring the direction of such roads.

Section 1066, says: Any Superintendent of Highways neglecting to cause said roads to be posted and numbered, and to have pointers erected as aforesaid shall be liable to pay the sum of ten dollars for each and every such neglect, to be recovered by indictment in the Court of General Sessions of the County wherein the same occurs, &c.

Very few pointers can be found at any of the forks of our roads, and what mile posts are older than reconstruction. It is a wonder how members of the many Grand Juries that have served, have been able to reach the Court House and return home and not see that posts and pointers both are wanting on many of our roads.
