A ROYAL WELCOME TO THE GOVERNOR'S PARTY.

Gov. Thompson Opens the Ball—Mr. Murray Always Ready—Senator Butler's fiery Address—A Brilliant Speech from Beant—A Brief Talk from Deane.

NEWBERRY, October 3.—The elation and enthusiasm of the canvass are being increased and intensified as the State canvassers in their victorious march through the State are drawing nearer to the seaboard.

THE UP-COUNTRY ABLAZE WITH DEMOCRATIC ENTHUSIASM.

THE SPIRIT OF 1876 REVIVED—A GRAND TOUR OF THE STATE BY SENATOR BUTLER AND HIS PARTY.

NEWBERRY, October 3.—The Democracy of Newberry on Thursday morning organized and proceeded on their tour of the State, and the result of this loyal and manly policy was exhibited in the splendid array and vigor with which the canvassers at the meeting to-day.

THE HON. E. B. MURRAY

was then introduced, and went at once into a discussion of the change in feeling and the rise of principles to which the present National Republican party owed its birth.

THE HON. W. C. BENEY,

the next speaker, said he would admit that the coming fight was both unique and important. Its importance and peculiarity were not that of free-trade against protection, but it was unique because it was the first time in the country that parties had divided on issues of purity against bribery.

SENATOR BUTLER

was the next speaker. It would be impossible to describe the enthusiasm and the unbounded applause which greeted the announcement of the Senator's name. Several times he essayed to speak, but his voice was drowned in the tumult.

SOLICITOR D. R. DUNCAN,

the next speaker, delivered but a short address, owing to the lateness of the hour to which the meeting had been prolonged.

AN ORDINANCE,

To Prevent Obstruction of the Streets, Ways, Alleys and Sidewalks of the Town of Newberry.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE MAYOR AND ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF NEWBERRY, IN COUNCIL ASSEMBLED AND BY THE AUTHORITY OF THE SAME:

SECTION 1: That any person or persons, who shall suffer or allow any omnibus, carriage, buggy, dray, wagon, cart or any other vehicle, without a horse attached, to remain upon the streets, ways, alleys or sidewalks of the Town of Newberry, during the night time or on Sundays, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before the Mayor, or the Mayor and Aldermen of said Town of Newberry, shall be sentenced to pay a fine of not more than Five dollars or to imprisonment in the guard house of the said Town of Newberry for not more than thirty days.

SECTION 2: That any person or persons, who shall be in charge or control of an engine or a car or cars operated upon the track of a railroad company, who shall stop the same or any one of them upon or across any of the streets of the Town of Newberry longer than ten minutes, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before the Mayor or the Mayor and Aldermen of said Town of Newberry, shall be sentenced to pay a fine of not more than Thirty dollars or to imprisonment in the guard house of the said Town of Newberry for not more than thirty days.

SECTION 3: That any person or persons, who shall cause a vehicle of any kind, drawn by a horse or horses or by hand to remain stationary at or upon any crossing of the streets of the Town of Newberry shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before the Mayor or the Mayor and Aldermen of said Town of Newberry, shall be sentenced to pay a fine of not more than Five dollars or to be imprisoned in the Guard-house of the said Town of Newberry for not more than thirty days.

SECTION 4: That any person or persons who shall place, any fire wood, coals, boxes, crates, trunks, goods, wares, merchandise, carriages of any description to him, her or them belonging or consigned, on any street, lane, alley, sidewalk, or public thoroughfare, within the Town of Newberry for and during twenty-four hours, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before the Mayor or Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Newberry, shall be sentenced to pay a fine of not more than Five dollars or to be imprisoned in the Guard-house of the said Town of Newberry for not more than thirty days.

SECTION 5: That any person or persons who shall erect or repair any building or buildings upon any street, lane or alley within the said Town of Newberry, and shall place any building materials upon any street, lane or alley, without first obtaining from the Mayor and Aldermen of Newberry, permission in writing to place any such building materials upon any said street, lane or alley, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before the Mayor or the Mayor and Aldermen of the said Town of Newberry, shall be sentenced to pay a fine of not more than thirty dollars, or to be imprisoned in the Guard-house of the said Town of Newberry for not more than thirty days.

SECTION 6: That the provisions of this ordinance shall take effect on and after the thirtieth day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

Done and ratified under the corporate seal of the Town of Newberry, South Carolina, on this seventh day of October, in the year of our Sovereignty and Independence of the United States of America.

And it shall be lawful for the Chief of Police from time to time to examine and test the correctness of all weights and measures, usual in trade, within the corporate limits of the town of Newberry, and to report all violations of law in this particular.
