GOOD NEWS FOR TAXPAYERS.

The Pension List, and Consequently the Pension Burden, has Begun to Decrease.

Washington, September 10.—The annual report of Commissioner of Pensions Ware places the total number of pensioners now on the rolls at 993,445, of which 729,356 are soldiers and 267,189 are widows and dependents. Mr. Ware announces that it is not probable that the pension roll will again cross the million line, the high water mark having been reached a year ago.

The roll shows a net loss of 2,901 pensioners during the year. Out of a total of 304,833 applications on hand during the year, 130,109 were admitted and 113,794 rejected. The average annual value of the Spanish war pension roll has reached \$1,765,310.

The total payments in pensions for all wars is \$3,038,623,590; on account of the civil war \$2,862,240,400.

The cost of the pension system per capita of the population for 1903 is given as \$1.75. The system, according to Commissioner Ware, was the greatest as a burden to the people of the United States in 1893, since which time it has shrunk from \$2.24 to \$1.32 per \$1,000 of taxable wealth, and in ten years, he says, the burden will cease to be noticed.

YORK COUNTY'S GRAND JURY.

Committee Warns the Southern Railway of Other Danger Points Liable to Cause Wrecks.

The State. Yorkville, Sept. 10.—A committee of the grand jury, taking J. J. Keller, a local contractor, with them as an expert, have examined portions of the Southern railway and made the following report, serving a copy on the agent of the road here:

As the result of an investigation made yesterday by committee in person and through the examination of witnesses we are satisfied that your trouble over Bullock's creek is in an unsafe and dangerous condition.

We have also noticed numerous rotten ties along the line of the track and especially on the curve approach Turkey creek, and in fact all along section 48, which we have been over carefully. From what we have seen we consider that Bullock's Creek trestle is in danger of falling at almost any time and we also believe that there is grave danger of wreck because of rotten ties.

We recommend that you make the repairs indicated without delay and that you exercise especial care and caution in the use of the track at least until said repairs are completed.

KILLED HIS OWN GRANDSON.

The Horrible Misfortune of Major Riddle of Lancaster While Hunting in Chester County.

Lancaster, September 11.—A heartrending tragedy was enacted this morning, about 8 o'clock, across the river in Chester county, in which a prominent Lancasterian was the principal actor.

Yesterday afternoon Major J. M. Riddle, one of the proprietors of the Lancaster Review, accompanied by his son, J. M. Riddle, Jr., and his little grandson, Robert Mackorell, of Yorkville, a lad about 8 years old, went over to Chester County on a squirrel hunt.

While hunting on the river bank this morning Major Riddle fired on what he supposed to be a squirrel in the bushes, but, on approaching the object of his aim, he discovered to his horror his grandson in the agony of death, the unfortunate little fellow having received the entire load.

When Major Riddle reached him the boy exclaimed: "Grandpa, you have shot me." Picking the lad up in his arms Major Riddle rushed to a spring nearby to wash the blood off the wound, but the child died in the grandfather's arms on the way to the spring.

The body was brought here today on the Lancaster and Chester midday train and will be buried tomorrow. As to be expected the grandfather and other members of the family are overwhelmed with grief.
