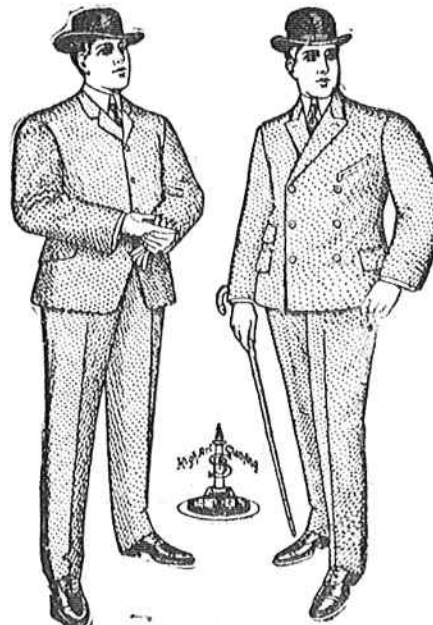

TEN THOUSAND MASSACRED.

Horrible Turkish Atrocities in Bulgaria, Wholesale Murders and Burnings.

Sofia, Bulgaria, September 18.—The foreign office here has received reliable information that the Turks have destroyed the town of Kastoria, thirty-six miles south of Monastir, and have massacred the population.

The population of Kastoria numbers about 10,000 persons and the massacre of such a number in one place exceeds anything which has yet occurred in Macedonia. At the present critical moment, when popular feeling is intense, the effect of the report of such stupendous slaughter may be most serious.

WHOLESALE MURDER AND BURNING.

Sofia, Bulgaria, September 18.—Further reports from Kastoria say the city is burning and that the massacre of its population (estimated to have numbered 10,000 persons) was indescribably terrible. The Turks slaughtered indiscriminately Bulgarians and Greeks, men, women and children.

TURKS KILL 300 BULGARIANS.

Salonica, September 18.—Three hundred Bulgarians have been killed in a fight between insurgents and Turkish troops between Okrida and Dibra. The Bulgarian dead included many officers, one of whom wore a Russian decoration.

ATROCITIES UNDERESTIMATED.

London, September 18.—The Westminster Gazette says a well known London journalist cables from Belgrade as follows:

"Starting with Pro Turkish sympathies, I have found overwhelming evidence convincingly proving that the Turkish atrocities are rather under-estimated in the reports of British consuls, bankers and unprejudiced people. Foreign Minister Tzokoff tells me he knows cases of starving women in the forests killing two of their own children to preserve the third. The forest wanderers will all perish of cold within two months."

REUBEN PITTS GOES FREE.

Young School Teacher Who Shot and Killed His Pupil, Ed Foster, At Inman.

Spartanburg, Sept. 19.—The Pitts murder trial is at end, and the defendant goes free. This is the result of a deliberation of 12 of his peers today. At the convening of court of general sessions this morning, the case was resumed. Argument was delivered by Judge Geo. W. Nicholls and Mr. Stanyarne Wilson, for the defendant, and Solicitor Searse for the prosecution. The arguments of each of the gentlemen were the subject of high praise and comment from a large number of auditors.

About 2 p. m. Judge Gary in a clear, concise, practical manner delivered his charge to the jury, and that body retired to deliberate over the case.

At 4.15 p. m., the jury announced a verdict and the court reassembled. The court room was packed with spectators, and a highly dramatic scene was enacted. After Judge Gary had taken his seat, Clerk of Court Trimmier announced the verdict. The young defendant fell forward on the desk in front of his chair. His sister, Mrs. C. O. Featherstone, shouted in a paroxysm of joy and relief of a nervous strain. Rev. J. D. Pitts, father of the defendant, was visibly affected, as were many others.

The crowd gave an enthusiastic and prolonged burst of applause on the result of the jury's findings.

The defendant was on the stand some time. He explained that he carried a pistol because he was fond of trying his marksmanship at inanimate objects. He had liked Ed Foster. He was assaulted by the four boys and the pistol went off while he and Foster were struggling for it. He only intended to fire in the air to frighten the boys off. He did not pull the trigger intentionally, if at all.

GUNNELLS CONVICTED.

The White Man In Greenville who Criminally Assaulted a Four-Year-Old Negro Girl.

Greenville, Sept. 19.—The trial of Robert T. Gunnells, white, indicted for the rape of a 4 year old negro girl, began at 10 o'clock this morning and ended at 6 o'clock this afternoon.

The evidence against the accused was altogether circumstantial, but it was strong and convincing and the only weak link in the chain of evidence was whether or not the rape had been accomplished. The injury to the child was serious and left no doubt as to what was the intention of the brutal assault but the actual crime was not proven and the blood upon the man's finger nails, when arrested a few hours afterwards indicated the manner of the injury to the child. The jury must have taken this view of the case as after an hour's deliberation the verdict was rendered of guilty under the second count of the indictment which was an assault with intent to ravish, the penalty for which is not exceeding ten years imprisonment.

Gunnells is 29 years old and has been working at the fertilizer factory. He has a vacant, listless countenance and is not at all bright. His victim will recover and the terrible wounds are healing slowly.

His crime was committed less than a week ago.
