Chief H. B. Wells spent months of time and some hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of thought on the building and the fine Italian hand of the fire chief is in evidence on every side. Newberry is fortunate in having men so entirely wrapped up in

the fire control business as to make great sacrifices for its futherance. The words "Newberry Fire Department" are engraved on the snow white front of the building. We have seen nothing in cities here about to compare in utility and beauty.

The engine room will house six pieces of apparatus. Provision has peen made for fire alarm and battery rooms at the rear and hose storage racks on the left wall.

Leading upstairs are two sets of steps. Here are arranged four living apartments to accommodate four night drivers should such number be needed. The rear apartments have temporary partitions which may be removed in case the department ever ecomes full time paid, allowing a domitory with the front or chief's
