BOOKS, STATIONERY, POSTAGE & PRINTING

Table listing expenses for books, stationery, postage, and printing.

Table listing expenses for salaries and office expenses.

Table listing expenses for printing quarterly reports, magistrate's expenses, and office expenses.

Table listing expenses for rent relief organizations and old claims.

Table listing miscellaneous expenses including Bogenau Bros., Nichols Studio, and C. W. Sanders.

Table listing court expenses and sheriff's dieting.

TRADE COLLAPSE PROVES A BOOM

AUGUSTA, Maine. Just 36 hours after warning that southern competition is slowly driving Maine's 100 woolen mills out of the state, Governor Lewis O. Brown returned from the South...

The governor found that the river town of Hartland, Maine, which was caught in the all-New England collapse of textiles in 1922, is experiencing a major boom seldom surpassed in any previous period when the town was just part of a great New England textile kingdom.

A Bright Ray Shining. Although only a small town, Hartland's fight against great odds was seized upon by the governor as one bright ray of light shining thru otherwise gray industrial skies over Maine.

But Hartland has not waited for its tightly shut woolen mill to show evidences of new activity. It has gone after new industries in such a forceful way as to pull itself out of a slump of several years' duration, the governor said.
