FARM AND GARDEN.
 No plant yields anything like as much nutriment from the same extent of soil as the banana. Baron Humboldt estimated that it returns 20 times as much as the potato, and 113 times as much as the wheat.
 In wheat culture more depends upon the preparation of the soil than upon the variety of the seed. The more thorough the culture, the better the crop. It is better to drill in the seed than to sow broadcast. Seed wheat should be soaked in strong salt water and afterwards rolled in lime to kill the spores.
 SWEENEY IN HORSES.—A correspondent of the Cincinnati Gazette takes, to cure this disease, equal parts of tallow, beeswax, marrow (out of beaver's bones) and sheep's tallow, and from one gill to one quart of warm water also one tablespoonful of salt. Put the first four articles into a pot or kettle; melt them together; then put in the other two articles; and then apply it to the affected part of the horse; bathe in with a hot iron as hot as the horse can bear. You may work your horse right along.

A correspondent of the Country Gentleman, writing from Hamilton Mo., Ohio, says the system of all good hog raisers in that region is to pasture hogs in clover during the summer.—He presents, as the advantage of his plan, the statement that an acre of ground in clover will pasture five hogs four months, and that it will take the corn from half an acre to feed them the same time. The cultivation of the corn he counts equal to the rent of the other half acre. He further claims that hogs pastured on clover are in far better condition than if fed on corn, as they are larger framed, healthier, and eat better; and also states that the land is enriched by the clover pasturing.
 GATHER WOODS DIRT.—When going to work in the fields near the wood lot, take along a shovel and carry home at noon and at night a load of forest loam, or else set apart a day and devote it entirely to the purpose of collecting. Woods dirt is one of the best manures that can be used; it is one of the absorbents for the stable, and as a loan and fertilizer for soil it cannot be excelled. It is good upon all kinds of soil, and as cheap as the air.
 Leaves and loam form an excellent material for house banking and for covering vegetables buried in the fields or garden. Nature has designed the fallen leaves as a shield to the tree roots against the frost; a thin coating being almost impervious to that element, they are, therefore, exactly fitted for the use above mentioned. No better manure can be used upon the garden, as it will make the soil light, airy and at the same time give it the primitive qualities of fertility.
