STATE AND COUNTY FAIRS.

The season of Fairs has just commenced, and it yet remains to be seen whether we have made any progress as a nation of exhibitors. Fairs have been productive of much that has had a tendency to advance the farmers' interests, but at the same time much has taken place at these exhibitions not calculated to make these annual gatherings quite all that could be wished. We are not disposed to find fault with everything, but will say that much of the evil that creeps into these societies comes from bad men getting control. This it is the duty of responsible members to prevent. Those who desire that their annual exhibitions should be successful, must be content to labor for that end, and should they fail to do their duty in this regard, they should not complain that their fairs are not all they could wish them.

TO DRIVE AWAY BED BUGS.—An exchange gives the following as a sure way to drive bed bugs from old beds: "Take green tomato vines, put them in a basin or tray, pound them to pieces as fine as possible, then stain the bedstead, where they inhabit, with the juice, fill the crevices with pieces of vines, and lay leaves under the ends of the slats. If this is practiced twice a year, not a bug will remain in the bedstead."

Great care should be taken at this season to provide sufficient water for domestic animals. They should have a constant supply.

A large number of sheep raisers in the West, being dissatisfied with the price of wool, are holding their stock for better rates.

It has been determined, by careful experiments, that three and one-half pounds of corn will, when fed to swine, make one pound of pork.

TWO CROPS AT THE SAME TIME.—The New York Tribune says: Two different crops at the same time on the same ground by mixing the seed, is not very widely known, or if known, is very seldom made use of. The practice is not new for Scotch farmers have for years been in the habit of raising crops of oats and peas together, with the effect of gaining nearly as much as could be produced by raising these crops on different fields. Two and a half bushels of oats mixed with one bushel and a half of peas will yield a crop nearly, if not quite, equal in bulk to the two crops sown separately. Turnips are sown in rows between corn, and harrowed in after the last working, when the corn is laid by, will not affect the yield of corn, while very considerable crops for winter feed or fall pasture may be secured with very little expense for seed and labor. It is not at all uncommon for two hundred, or more bushels of turnips per acre to be raised thus on corn stubble, which, with the tops, has furnished a very welcome addition to the feeding resources of the farm. Rye thus sown can often be grazed by milking cows until after Christmas, and will have a marked effect on the quantity and quality of the butter.
