The weather for the last week has been very propitious for the gathering of cotton and ginning and bringing it to market, but there is an universal complaint among the planters that it is difficult to get the requisite labor.

The low price of cotton has prevented trade from opening so briskly as is usual at this time, but it is hoped that as the season advances, the inevitable result of a short crop of cotton, which is the staple trading crop of this section, will be to raise the price of that article and bring some spare cash to the unfortunate farmer, and make business brighter.

Who desires to see an enterprising inland town need only walk through our streets and see the new boxes on the sidewalks in piles, or go into our stores and see the fine stocks which they have on hand, or stop at the depot and see the bales of cotton which are daily shipped hence, besides other produce, also the piles of goods which arrive by every train.
