An Ordinance.

SEC. IX of an Ordinance adopted by the Town Council for fiscal year ending 1st April, 1872, and now re-adopted by present Council for fiscal year ending 1st April, 1873, is as follows:

For a License to carry on any Trade, Business, or Profession herein-after mentioned, shall be paid, viz: Apothecaries, \$5.00; Ambrosy, \$3.00; Architects, \$3.00; Auctioneers, \$5.00; Daguerian Artist, \$3.00; Banks or their Branches, \$5.00; Retail Dealers in goods, wares and merchandise, (excluding distilled spirits), whose annual sales are not over \$10,000, \$5.00; those whose annual sales are over \$10,000 and under \$30,000, \$10.00; those whose annual sales are over \$30,000 \$15.00; Dentists, each, \$4.00; Printing Offices, \$5.00; Lawyers or Attorneys, each, \$4.00; Barbers, \$4.00; Tailors, 2.00; Drays, Wagons, Omnibuses, and Carriages who haul for hire, each, 3.00; Circus, each, per day, to be paid before exhibition, 25.00; Menageries, each, per day, 10.00; Practising Physicians, each, 4.00; Peddlers per month, 5.00; Hacksters, 3.00; Cabinet Makers, 2.00; Hotels, 5.00; Boarding House, private, 3.00; Bakery, 2.00; Millinery, 2.00; Saddle and Harness Makers and repairers of same, 2.00; Livery Stables, 5.00; Gun Smiths and Black Smiths, each establishment, 3.00; Boot and Shoe Makers, 2.00; Jewelers and Watch and Clock Repairers, 2.00; Master, Mechanics and House Builders, 2.00.

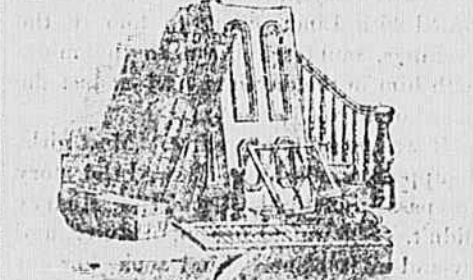
