The Late Rev. Stiles Mellichamp.

The subject of this Inlef sketch, so well and favorably known to the in this community, and whose death we so deeply deplore, was a son of St. Lo Mellichamp. a Revolutionary patriot, whose life has been enlarged upon by Gilmore Fimms. He is the last, but one, of a large family: his brother, St. Lo, who served as an officer in the war of 1812, still living at the age of 83.

The Rev. Mr. Mellichamp commenced life as a teacher in the Grammar school of the Charleston College. From thence he was called to a more advantageous position in Gillisonville. He also preached awhile in the Logan street Church of/Charleston.

For many years before the war he taught and preached on James Island, where he had established for himself a comfortable home, from which he was driven by the war to Orangeburg, where he has, until his death, been faithfully performing his duties as a minister of the Gospel.

It is sad to record that his old parishioners, as an inducement for him to return to his home on James Island, which had been completely devastated during the war, had, just completed for him a neat cottage on the island, where he indays.
