See. 142. That any person who shail enclose or conceal any letter, memorandum, or other thing in any mail matter not charged with letter postage, or make any writing or memorandum thereon, and deposit or cause the same to be deposited for conveyance by mail, for less than letter postage, shall, for every such offence forfeit and pay five dollars, and such newspaper or periodical shall not be de livered until the postage thereon is paid at letter rates.


