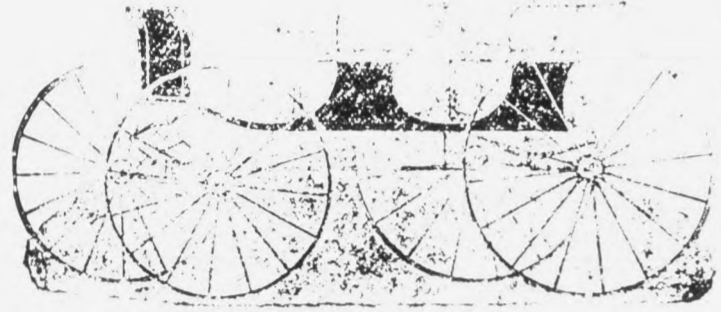

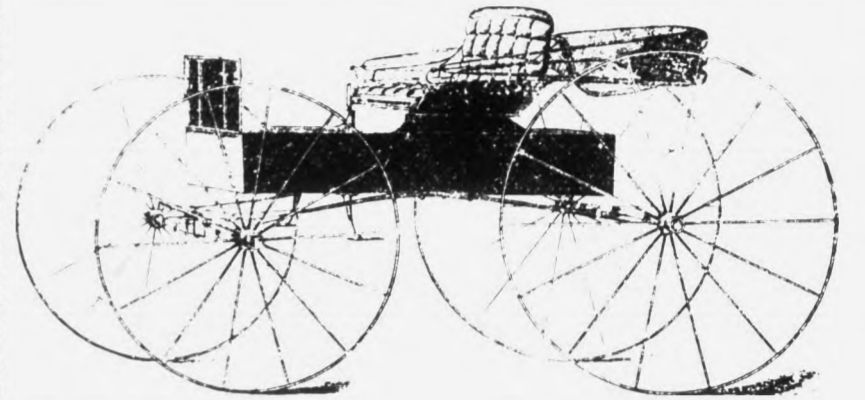

ENGINEER FELL

INTO DEEP BASIN

Clinton J Holroyd Drowned at the Waterworks Plant.

OVERCOME BY SUDDEN ILLNESS.

Could have saved himself easily but for this--No Funeral Arrangements.

Mr. Clinton J. Holroyd, an assistant engineer at the city waterworks plant, was drowned yesterday afternoon about 2:40 o'clock, the result, it is believed, of an attack of apoplexy, which caused him to fall into one of the consulting basins. He sank almost instantly and was under the water several minutes before located.

After that it required some time to bring his body to the surface and there was no hope of resuscitation. Had it not been for the apoplectic stroke he could very easily have pulled himself out of the water, although he could not swim.

There are a number of the consulting basins just outside the main filtering plant, each surrounded by wide cement walks and it is the duty of those in charge to inspect these basins several times each day. Workmen on the main filter just outside the large reservoir saw Mr. Holroyd at work and without warning suddenly staggered directly into one of the basins. As quickly as possible the alarm was given, but it was hard to find the body in the basins, which are 10 feet in depth.

Mr. Holroyd came from Waltham, Mass. several years ago and was an expert on engineering work in the sewerage and waterworks line. He was about 40 years of age. He was subject to attacks like that from which he suffered yesterday, and it was well known to those in charge of the waterworks that he was liable to such attacks.

Last Thursday afternoon, April 24, 1907, while Mr. W. E. Dargan was riding in his home at Hymansville in Florence county, he became suddenly very ill near the house of Mrs. Hyman. Mrs. Hyman sent for her husband who is a physician and Dr. McLeod from Florence was also summoned by telephone, but nothing could be done for Mr. Dargan and he died the next morning. The cause of his death is supposed to have been apoplexy, brought on by acute indigestion. When the news of his death reached Darlington Friday morning the community was shocked. Mr. Dargan had always been a strong, healthy man and one so full of life that no one could believe he had passed away so suddenly.
