Weekly Weather Bulletin.

For the Week Ending 8 a. m., August 12, 1907.

The week had moderate temperatures, ample sunshine, normal relative humidity, and scattered showers occurred on Monday and Tuesday.

Thoroughly moist tropical air swept in the evening of the 10th, and the weather was cloudy, normal, and the public portion with maximum temperatures of 80 degrees, and occasional showers in the afternoon. The extreme was 100 at Blacksburg on the 8th and 54 at Darlington on the 10th. The weekly mean temperature was nearly normal.

The rainfall was excessive in a few places in the eastern and north central portions, and was generally light in the western division, though a few places in the extreme western portions had amount in excess of one inch. The heaviest rainfall for the week was 4.15 inches at Society Hill. The average precipitation for the State was below the normal.

Severe thunderstorms occurred on the 9th over the whole State, and they were accompanied by obstructive winds and by light hail in places. The greatest damage was noted in the northwestern counties.
