What Boliver Knows About Tissue Ballots.

The little episode of Tuesday's experience proves that "the best laid plans of mice and men oft gang a'glee," and that the most certain expectations are sometimes doomed to the saddest disappointment.

The citizens of our town during the week previous had been kept at fever heat over the probable result of the approaching municipal election and every Democrat was anxious to do something which would help to make that result favorable to his party. On Monday afternoon Mr. Robt. Copes, knowing that the Reds are up to all kinds of ways that are dark and tricks that are vain, was on the alert, and discovered by one of his short-hand methods, that Mr. Geo. Boliver, the Radical candidate for Mayor, had become weak in the knees, and to bolster up his failing hopes, had printed two sets of tissue ballots with the names of the Democratic nominees upon one and those of his own ticket upon the other, samples of which he procured. This becoming generally known to the public it became necessary for the irrepressible Boliver to do something which might rid himself of the burden of an intended fraud.

Mr. T. C. Allergotti, a staunch Democrat and Straightouter, who about that time had business everywhere, while searching for Dr. Malone to procure a ballot box, noticed that the windows and door of the Clerk's office were closed, but seeing Mr. Stanton, one of Boliver's clerks, enter the office, he followed him in, and behold! there was Boliver, E. A. Webster, the assistant postmaster, and Dr. Malone in close consultation in one of the dark corners. Mr. Allergotti not wishing to intrude upon the privacy of the gentlemen withdrew, not without a determination, however, of seeing the end. He had not long to wait, for in a short time Mayor Moseley received the following communication from Mr. Boliver which was doubtless the result of the above mentioned consultation:

ORANGEBURG, S. C., Sept. 8, 1879. We the undersigned candidates for the position for Mayor of the above town hereby agree that no tissue tickets shall be used; and, further, agree that if used, the same shall be counted out by the managers of said election, also for Aldermen.

This child of Radical cunning was turned over to the guardian care of the Democratic Executive Committee who returned the following answer by way of a final settlement of the matter:

ORANGEBURG, S. C., Sept. 8, 1879. Geo. Boliver, Esq.:

Sir—Your proposition, "that no tissue tickets be used, and that, if used, the same shall be counted out by the managers of the pending election for Mayor and Aldermen of this town," sent to Mr. J. W. Moseley, has been referred by that gentleman to the undersigned, Executive Committee. This Committee desires to have you understand that we have information amounting to positive proof, that you have been caught at the trick of having tissue tickets prepared for use at the said election; that we, as representatives of our party, repudiate any such course on our part, and desire a strictly fair, honest and legal election; desiring such a conduct of said election as will prevent the use of any unfair means, and that we decline any further communication with you.

To make things doubly sure, on the morning of the election, just before the voting commenced, and while a large number of citizens were standing round the polls, Mr. Robt. Copes appeared upon the scene and producing two of the tissue ballots—one of each kind—charged Mr. Boliver with the intended fraud, and requested the managers to see to it that not one entered the box. Mr. Boliver was present and did not deny the charge. Of course Mr. Boliver had a perfect right to have tissue tickets printed with the names of his own candidates on them, but he had no right to have another set printed with the names of the Democratic candidates; and his having done so shows that he intended to stuff the ballot-box with them, putting in a few of those with our candidates to make it appear that the Democrats used them too. But the plan didn't work. Our readers have been accustomed to political dodges, but this beats anything heretofore concocted in Orangeburg by the fertile brain of the most unscrupulous Radical. It was a devilish scheme devised to obtain the signature of Mr. Moseley, the Democratic candidate, to a paper which would implicate his party as deeply in the intended fraud as Boliver himself was. We congratulate our citizens that our escape from the same was made in a

manner that damned the Radical ticket and consigned it to an inglorious defeat. Boliver, this time, counted without his host and learned that the good citizens of Orangeburg, for all time to come, will have none of him.

Col. M. I. Browning, our worthy County Chairman, and Messrs. B. Frank Slater, G. A. Schifley, Robt. Copes, D. E. Smoak, Z. J. King, W. B. Thompson, J. M. Brunson, J. S. Albergotti and W. G. Albergotti, who acted in concert with him, deserve the "hearty well-done" of the citizens of our town for the glorious Democratic victory of last Tuesday. This was the first election under Col. Browning's administration and it was a grand success.
