Bureau of Agriculture.

In the report from this Department the Commissioner recommends that power be granted by the Legislature to employ an immigration agent; that improved varieties of seeds be purchased for distribution among the farmers of the State;

The affairs of this department are evidently controlled by an energetic and competent officer and, if properly supported by the Legislature and people, may do much for the advancement of the Agricultural interest of the State.

The School Department.

Superintendent Hugh S. Thompson gives in his annual report a most encouraging account of the department under his charge.

He recommends that in addition to the present state appropriation, each school District be authorized to levy and collect a local tax for the special benefit of its own schools.

The aid obtained from the Peabody Fund was appropriated to the expenses of the Normal Institute at Spartanburg.

There are now within the limits of the State 3,331 Colleges and public and private schools at which the children are trained and this number is not sufficient for the necessities of the state.
