NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT the office of the Treasurer of Sumter County will be open at Sumter Court House from the FIFTEENTH DAY OF SEPTEMBER, 1881, to the THIRTY FIRST DAY OF OCTOBER, 1881, for the collection of State, County, School, Poll, and Special Taxes for the Fiscal Year commencing November 1, 1880.
