# LABOR BOARD CUTS WAGES

House of Commons House Military Com- More Than Fortyeight Millions Taken From Pay Rolls-Cut of Five Cents an Hour for Four Hundred Thousand Employees

> Chicago, May 28 (By the Associated Press) .- More than \$48,-000,000 ras slashed from the wages of 400,000 railway employees in a decision by the United States railroad labor board tonight. The decreases, which averaged five cents per hour in the majority, followed cuts of \$400,000,000 made last July by the board. The negro was apprehended on the public square this afternoon by E. L. McClure, a telegraph operator, who took him to the home of the girl. When the negro entered the room the girl screamed that it was he who attacked

The father then seized a pistol and began firing. A crowd stormed the undertaking parlor where the body was taken, dragged the corpse behind a truck through the streets and burned it on the public

Afterward, the body was tied to a truck and dragged through the negro section, followed by the erowd. Many motor cars were dashing in and out of the negro district a few minutes after the killing became known.
