Washington, Nov. 27 .- Midshipnen from the Naval academy who celebrated over-indulgently after the annual Army-Navy football game Saturday were held up to public scorn today by Secretary Denby in one of the most stinging rebukes ever administered by ecretary of the navy.

Many members of the corps, Mr. Denby declared in a public state nent not only disgraced themselves and the uniform but their conduct at a ball which followed the game in Philadelphia brought such shame upon the academy itself as it never had known before.

The secretary said he did not now how many of the midshipmen "drank heavily" and was convinced that the great majority conducted themselves with propriety. But he added that enough of them had failed in their duty "to bring shame upon all."

He announced that an investigation would be begun at once and that steps would be taken to inure that "such an occurrence will never be repeated.

None of the guilty were name in the secretary's indictment nor did it appear tonight that the department would find it possible to single out any individual midshipmen for punishment. It was indiated that the inquiry probably would take the direction of a gen eral effort to establish what the conditions were that made the inident possible and that any disiplinary action prebably would fall upon the entire Annapolis establishment in such a way as to keep the corps hereafter within
