A. G. Wood had a fine male to die a few days ago.

Mr. Charlie Page cut his foot very bad with an axe a few days back.

Mr. J. W. Smith has bought a new engine, and has placed it in running order at his old stand at Kelton, and is now ready to do work in good style, such as grinding wheat, corn, and sawing lumber and ginning cotton.

On the 10th of January, a little before twelve o'clock, little Annie Maney breathed out her life and crossed over the river to dwell with the Angels in Heaven. Annie was 4 years, 4 months and 4 days old. Dr. Kim Littlejohn, of Jonesville, was her doctor and he attended to her faithfully for eighteen months, but could not cure her disease, which was scrofula.

Mrs. Daniel Inman died the 15th of January, and was buried at Mt. Joy on the 16th.

Mr. Joseph Cook lost a child a few days ago.

Rev. J. W. Harris has agreed to teach school at Foster's Academy with Rev. G. F. Clarkson as his assistant.

Jonesville.

JAN. 28.—But little has been said, and no arrangements yet made about giving this year. The farmers seem to be very indifferent about it. One thing very sure, they can't afford to use it very largely at former prices and pay for it with present prices of cotton. The schools in our Township have about all got under way. There has been some little friction in our locality about the public school, but that was adjusted last Saturday.

Miss Dora Whitlock teaches at Elford Grove. Miss Mollie Littlejohn at Lindsay's. Miss Carrie Southard at Rocky Creek. Miss Mamie Bailey, at Fair Forest; Miss Mamie Heath at Courton; Miss Alice Stirling at Bishop's; and Miss Mildred Perkins at Assistant Prof. Aycock at Jonesville. The schools are all in good hands when they are committed to such a corps of teachers as these.

Several witnesses have been bound over at Spartanburg this week. Mr. J. W. Bates goes as eye witness in the J. D. Kirby case, and the others are in the case against Robt. Poole for the murder of Will Long. Poole and Long were both colored men and lived about Jonesville but the murder was committed in Spartanburg about three years ago. Poole made his escape and was only arrested a few days ago in Va., and brought back and lodged in Spartanburg jail. According to the statement of the witnesses it was cold blooded murder.

Mrs. Nancy McWhirter, the mother of Mrs. T. L. Hames, had a stroke of paralysis a few days ago and is in a critical condition. The people of our Town are generally very healthy.

From the weather outlook now no more oats can be sown until February. Seed oats are scarce here, hardly enough to supply the demand.

Farmers should take advantage of the first good spell of weather in next month to sow oats in large areas of this responsible crop. The man who neglects to raise his own supplies is too surely hastening his own destruction. More "hog and henry" and less cotton should be our motto. This is our only method of self protection. Financial relief through legislation seems to be far in the future, more bonds and less money for the people, say the "gold bugs."

#### Town Ordinance.

ORDINANCE AGAINST SELLING ANY KIND OF LIQUOR WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF UNION.

BE it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Union in Council assembled, and by authority of same:

SECTION 1.  
That from and after the passage of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any one to retail Wine, Brewed, Malt or Spirituous Liquors or any mixture thereof within the Corporate limits of the Town of Union, S. C. except as sold at the Dispensary.

SECTION 2.  
That any one violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction before the town Council be punished for each offence by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars or imprisonment for not more than twenty days in the discretion of the Town Council.

SECTION 3.  
That all evidence given at a trial resulting in conviction shall be turned over to the state authorities to be tried under the Dispensary act.
