Town Ordinance.

OBDINANCE AGAINST SELLING ANY KIND OF LIQUOR WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF UNION.

Br it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Union in Council assembled, and by authority of same:

SECTION, 1. That from and after the passage of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any one o retail Wine, Brewed, Malt or Spirituous Liquors or any mix'ure thereof witin the Corporate limits of the Town of Union, S. C. except as sold at the Dispensary.

That any one violating any of the provisons of this ordinance shall upon conviction before the town Council be punished for each offence by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars or imprisonment for not more than twenty days in the discretion of the Town

Section, 3. That all evidenc given at a trial resulting in conviction shall be turned over to the Dispensary act.
