"The time and the manner must remain mysterious for a while yet," said General Crowder. "They will be made public as soon as possible.

As Regulars.

President Wilson's proclamation drafting the National Guard into the federal service as of August 5, means that from that time forward the men can be ordered anywhere, at home or abroad, the same as regulars. The drafting of the guard, with the regular army, will give the nation approximately 600,000 fighting men. When the conscript forces are brought in about September 1 this number will be increased by the national army of 500,000 and the extra 187,000 who will be used as reserves and to fill the ranks of the regulars and guardsmen to full war strength.

The dates that the guardsmen will be mustered in remain as previously set. They will mobilize in three increments-on July 15, July 25 and

Those coming in on July 15 are: New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, West Virginia, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota, South Da-

kota and Nebraska. The July 25 increment includes: Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, District of Columbia, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Illinois, Montana, Wyoming, Idaho, Washington and Oregon.

The remaining ones who will come in on August 5, are: Indiana, Kentucky, Georgia, Florida, Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Texas, Missouri, Kansas, Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona, Utah and California.

Rank. The proclamation adds that all of-

ficers of the national guard not above the rank of colonel shall upon acceptance hold similar rank in the regular army. The non-commissioned of-ficers of the guard are drafted in at their present ratings.
