Mrs. J. G. Bishop is visiting her sister, Mrs. Johnnie Gallman, of Bethlehem community this week. Vero.

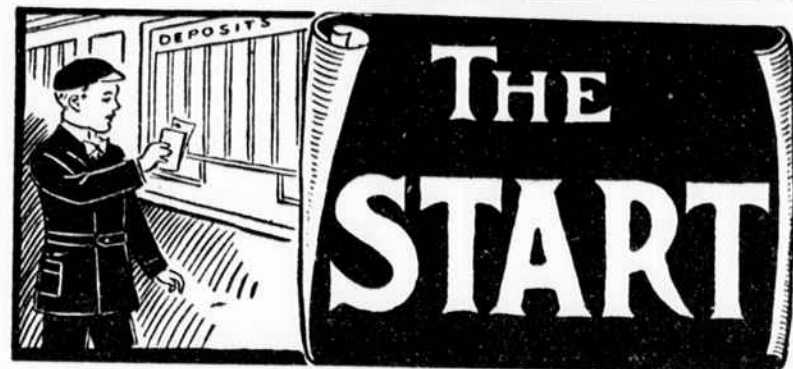

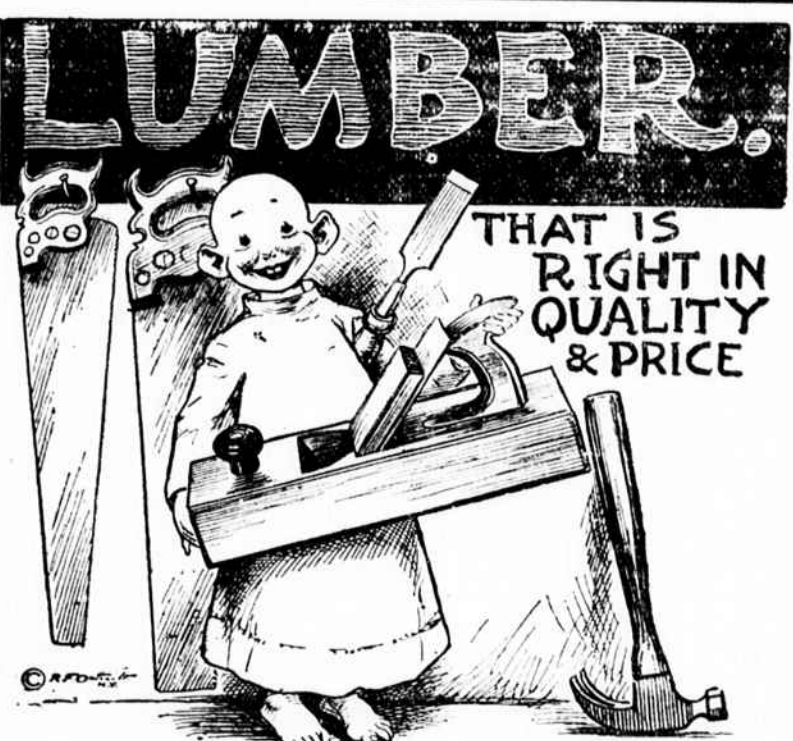
