Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Gault of Great Falls are visiting in this section to see their parents and relatives and their many friends. They speak well of their town, saying it is building up very fast and is a very business town.

Union county and Pinckney township has lost another good citizen by death. Two weeks ago Rev. John Farr was buried at Foster's Chapel. Rev. Farr was not in the county when he died, but he was reared in Union county. I knew him well. I heard about the first prayer he ever made and the first sermon he ever preached, and can say for him, not that it will do him any good, but for my own good feelings I want to express, and for his relatives and friends I will say he was a devoted Christian, from the time he connected himself with the church he set out to work. He did his part in the prayer meeting; as an exhorter he did a great work in his community, in his church, before he became a minister of the gospel; and I will say his good influence will forever live in his own township, where he was reared and his good works will follow him.

Uncle George Gault died at his home in Pinckney township last Saturday morning, 29th, and was buried at Flat Rock, his old church, Sunday. I will say he was a man firm in his belief in what he thought was right; he never wavered, and always stuck to what he thought was right, regardless of what others might think or say. He always backed his own judgment and went ahead. He was a Confederate soldier; would have been 73 years old had he lived until the 11th day of November. He would attend all the reunions and would always look forward to going. It was never held to far away for him to go. He was an official member of his church; had been a steward for many years. He was a worker in his church. There was a large concourse of friends at the burial. There were between seven and eight hundred people there. Among them was a large crowd of negroes to look at him the last time. There were many old negroes with tears in their eyes, for they knew he had been a good friend to them. He has many relatives and loved ones and many friends to mourn his loss.

Mr. B. F. Gregory raised a very fine watermelon weighing 52 pounds and sold it for \$1.00. He has many larger ones to sell yet.


