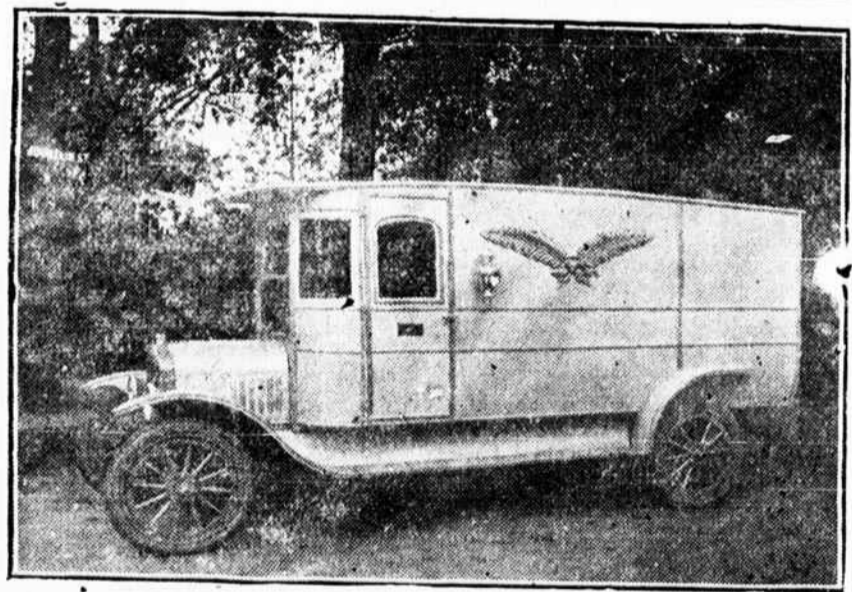

PORK ECONOMY

Clemson College, July 3.—An authority said recently that he believed that more good hogs had been introduced into South Carolina during the past year than in any other Southern State. If that is true, a great deal of attention must be given to pasture building and to the growing of forage crops for hogs in this State, if the farmers are to grow pork economically.

Mr. V. W. Lewis, Extension Agent in Animal Husbandry, has prepared some suggestions to the farmer who has one sow and wishes to produce two litters of pigs a year. Summed up, his suggestions are given below. Those wishing the circular letter giving fuller information may obtain it by writing the Extension Division, Clemson College, S. C.

1. Plant at least one acre of good land to Bermuda Grass, Japan Clover and other grasses and clovers that do well in your section.
2. Prepare 2 one-acre lots for each sow and litter of six pigs.
3. Plant one of the above one-acre lots in rape as early after August the 15th as possible; plant the other one-acre lot in rye as early after September 15th as possible.
4. Plant one of the above lots to soy beans from April 1st to May 15th; plant the other lot in soy beans or peanuts from May 1st to June 10th.
5. Raise two litters of pigs from your one sow, or from each sow.
6. Use the spring-born litter of pigs for home use.

7. Sell the fall-born litter of pigs about May.

Each neighbor on a party line is entitled to a reasonable use of the telephone service, and should not be interrupted or have the privacy of his conversation interfered with.
