Spartanburg, May 7.—Here in Spartanburg, if one comes in the right spirit, the determination to seek enjoyment upon the higher planes, everything seems to lend itself to satisfy conditions. First, nature, in her most beauteous raiment, tenders her perfect days; the fresh, invigorating crispness of early morning, the welcome noon glow of a May-day sun; the equally welcome cool of the late afternoon; and, to finish the whole, a glorious evening.


