## WONDERFUL RECUPERATIVE FORCE.

Quick Recovery From the Greatest Disaster That Ever Occurred to the Industries of the County.

Spartanburg has been singularly free from business failures or disasters of any kind affecting the commercial and industrial enterprises. One notable exception was the cloudburst of June, 1902. This freshet which swept away more than a \$1,000,000 worth of profitably running machinery, destroyed lives and rendered hundreds of families homeless and penniless, struck a tender chord in the hearts of the American people and relief subscriptions for the needy came so promptly and generously that the relief committee sent out notice after the first few days that no more help was needed. The mills at Clifton and Pacolet where the fury of the storm was felt greatest, did a noble part by their homeless operatives and suffering was reduced to a minimum.

## STOCKS REMAINED ABOVE PAR.

The fact that these great corporations had lost fully half their tangible assets did not depreciate their stock below par. The wonderful faith of home people and outside investors prevented anything like a panic and after the first shock, and the work of providing for the safety and comfort of the individual losers, all thoughts turned toward re-building the waste places and in a remarkably short time the great wheels began to turn again furnishing employment to even a greater number of people.

Some of the wreck scenes show the havoc that was wrought. Today no magnificent buildings with more improved machinery mark the places so recently desolated. This cloudburst which seemed to culminate along the headwaters of the Pacolet river, was a totally new experience in this section. It was practically the first serious disaster the mills had ever suffered. The floods swept away every bridge in the county, but the disaster proved a benefactor in a sense, for the former wooden structures were replaced in many instances by magnificent steel bridges and all were built more substantially.

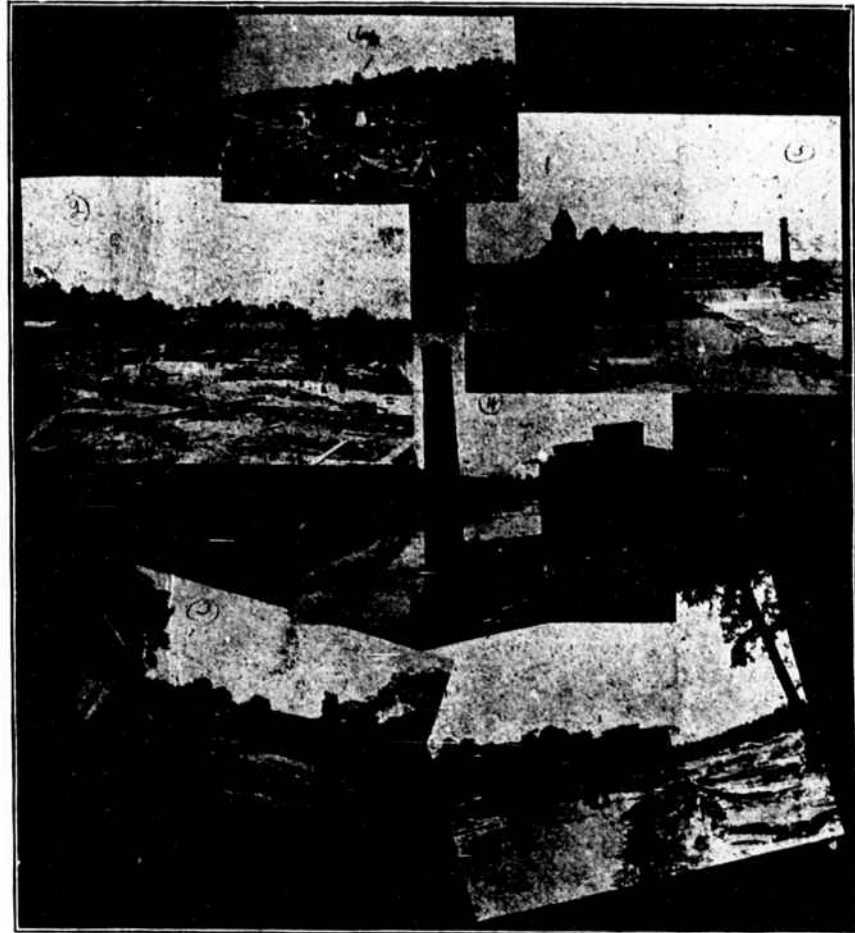

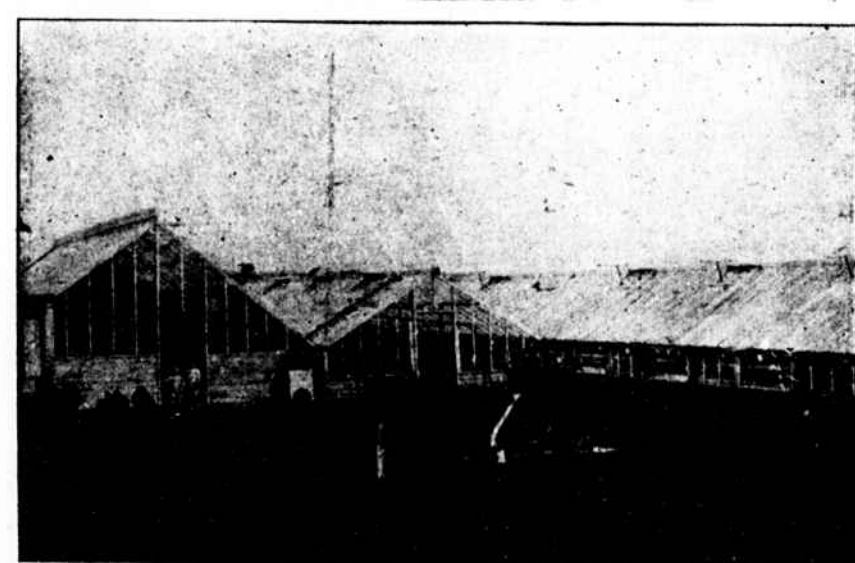


VIEWS OF THE 1903 FRESHET.

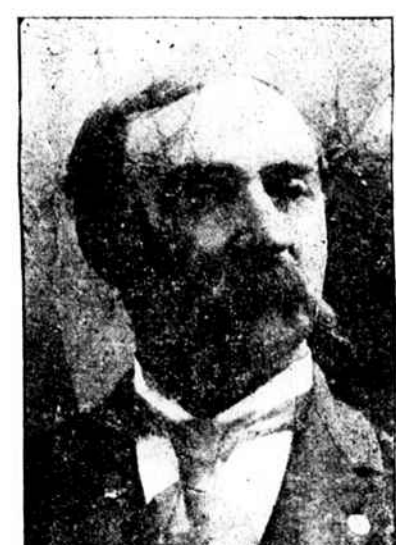

## CHAS. A. MOSS' GREENHOUSES.

One of the most remarkably successful enterprises in this city are the gardens of Chas. A. Moss, the florist, No. 553 South Church street. Mr. Moss is a native of Iowa where he learned the flower business. Like many others from the north and northwest who have tested the advantages of Spartanburg, he is pleased. He began here on a very modest scale in the spring of 1901, with 550 feet of glass. He raised pot plants for bedding mostly, but was successful in selling them. He saw a growing demand for cut flowers and bent his energies in this direction. He is a man of indomitable energy and pluck and hence has added from one to two hot houses to his plant every year since the first and is now preparing one for chrysanthemums exclusively. He has 6,850 feet of glass, all hot-water heated and modern in all respects. His greenhouses are conveniently located on the car line and a visitor who does not inspect his gardens finds a visit to Spartanburg complete. Mr. Moss finds the demand for cut flowers growing rapidly. This year he has three times as many carnations as ever before. He also has fruit trees, shade trees, ornamental hedges and shrubs and a great variety of ornamental plants. His establishment fills a long-felt want and in a few years will equal any in the state.
