The House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole, Mr. Williams in the chair.

Mr. Wilkes advocated at some length the merits of the bill; showed in a lucid manner the great necessity of its passage, placing it upon the grounds of justice towards the sovereigns of that large and highly intelligent district.

Mr. Dantzer said that he would vote for the bill, and as he represented one of the parishes, he felt it to be a duty incumbent upon him to explain the reasons which had induced him to do so.

Mr. Middleton moved that the committee how rise and report the bill to the House without amendment.

Before taking the vote, Mr. B. F. Perry rose and ably replied to Mr. Dantzer. Mr. Dantzer briefly rejoined.

Mr. Tilman said that, inasmuch as he was a new member, he felt extremely reluctant to occupy the time of the House; but as some assertions had been made by gentlemen which had not been replied to, he felt it his duty to do so.

The Committee then rose, and reported the bill to the House without amendment, and recommended that the bill be passed. A second reading was called for.

Mr. Ambler moved a call of the House, and the doorkeeper was ordered to summon the absentees. The vote was taken by yeas and nays, and resulted as follows. Yeas 94, nays 22.

The bill was ordered to be sent to the Senate. The Committee appointed to count the votes for Commissioners in Equity, report that R. A. Thompson for Pickens District, and W. H. Parker for Abbeville District, were elected.
