t is generally conceded that unless the vote of New York can be turned against Lincoln his election is inevitable; and the recent elections in Pennsylvania, Ohio, and Indiana, leave small grounds of encouragement. In the Presidential election of 1856 in Pennsyl vania, the anti-Republican majority was 165,000 votes, whilst in the recent election it barely reaches the Democratic vote for Mr. Buchanan in 1856, and is exceeded by the Republican vote for Curtin by 32,000. Here is a Republican gain of near 200,000 votce, which have been lost to the cause of Conservatism, by the defection of the Douglas men in Pennsylvania. Sober and reflecting men are anticipating similar results in New York.

The only basis of hope seems to be that Lincoln in attempting to conciliate the South, may lose the abolition vote of New York. The New York Herald is now ringing the changes on this idea, but we have no confidence that it will turn the tide of Republican victory.
