EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT. COLUMBIA, S. C., October 12, 1860. By His Excellency, WILLIAM H. GIST, Governor and Commander in Chief in and over the State of South Carolina. WHEREAS Electors of President and Vice President of the United States are appointed by the General Assembly of South Carolina; and whereas an Act of Congress, passed in 1846, fixed the time when these Electors shall be appointed on a day when the Legislature of this State is in regular session; in consequence thereof, WILLIAM H. GIST, in the exercise of the authority conferred by the Constitution to convene the Legislature on extraordinary occasions, do issue this proclamation, calling upon those Senators of the General Assembly whose terms of office have not expired, and those who have been now recently elected, and the members of the House of Representatives who have been now recently elected to convene at Columbia on the FIRST MONDAY IN NOVEMBER NEXT, that they may be present on Tuesday following, to appoint Electors of President and Vice President, in conformity to the Act of Congress above referred to; and also that they may if advisable, take action for the safety and protection of the State. Given under my hand and the seal of the State at Columbia, on the twelfth day of October in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty.
