DANIEL MILES

One of the Oldest Citizens Buried in Randolph.

Watchman! What of the night? But lo, there is no answer, no sound from the one who for many years had answered this call on New Years night in Bethel A. M. E. Church. He has answered to the call of death, and yet there comes an echo from afar, saying, "It is well with thy soul."

Daniel Miles was one of our oldest citizens, for he had passed his 85th birthday. He passed away last Thursday and was buried in Randolph Cemetery.

He was one of old Bethel's first members and had served his God and church well. He was an ordained minister and had charge of the sacrament at his church on every 1st Sunday.

In his young days Mr. Miles worked at his trade, that of carpenters. As he grew older he had to give this up to take care of his truck farm.

Mr. Miles had passed his 50th year of married life. His wife, three daughters, three grandchildren and two great-sons survive him.

He died last Thursday after an illness of some months. Sometime ago it was thought that he would get better, but he suffered a relapse and his strength failed rapidly until the end.

The funeral services were held in his life long church, Bethel. The church was filled to its capacity with relatives and friends.

Rev. Adams had charge of the services, and was assisted by Rev. Pruitt and Rev. Moore, 2nd Calvary Baptist Church, Rev. Gibson, A. M. E. and Rev. P. P. Watson. From Bethel he was taken to Randolph Cemetery where our Watchman was laid to rest.

Principal Moton's Testimony.

Principal Moton of Tuskegee, speaking the other day in New York, before "wealthy and influential" white men of that city, said some things respecting current and prospective inter-racial relations in the South, which remarkable in themselves, acquired special interest by reason of the time and place of their utterance.

Booker Washington's successor affirmed without qualification—probably to the astonishment, perhaps the discomfiture of those whom he addressed—that progress toward right relations between white folk and his own race had been far greater during the last ten years in the South than in the North, while improvement in that field was proceeding at the moment in the South at a rate by comparison with which "things at the North seem standing still."

Dr. Moton admitted there had been a time when he would not have believed he would "live to see sentiment on the part of Southern white people so friendly in desire for justice and fair play." Abuses continue, misunderstandings persist; yet "the situation is growing better every day."

Ways and means are being devised for practical, wholesome, helpful inter-racial cooperation. No longer is it hazardous anywhere in the South for white folk to show good will for the Negro. That is itself mark and measure of no slight advancement. There is in both peoples a vast fund of goodwill, individual and collective, and life becomes more livable for both as ways are opened by which this goodwill can be given expression and effect.

Year by year machinery is improved by which representatives may talk out their problems with frankness and sympathy, but mass handling of relations remains far short of perfection, so that it seems likely that for the present the best and quickest results will be realized through the individual white man and the individual Negro practicing, consciously, in his own contacts with persons of the other race, the spirit and let-
