De Hart Hubbard

"Tiger" Downed in Second

In a fight scheduled for 12 rounds at the great Madison Square Gardens, the fighting "Tiger" from Atlanta, Ga. went down to defeat in the second round by a powerful opponent administered to the jaw, causing him to take the full count of ten.

The "Tiger" was the favorite from the start and began his rushes in the first round but the arms of the Bridgeport Conn. "Idol" ever impeded his progress. The "Tiger" was not so ferocious as in other battles. We would attribute this to over work as the "Tiger" has been taking on two or three opponents each week. Out of all fights this is one that he should not have lost, because this knockout sets him back almost as far as he had to start from.

A capacity house of 15,000 attended the match.

The "Tiger" did not seem hurt only a faint trickle of blood shown from his mouth as outward evidence of the battle. We are also of the opinion that the punch that knocked the "Tiger" out was a lucky one. The fight will be different the next time they meet.

TIGER FLOWERS MAKES MANY RING ENGAGEMENTS

New York, Jan. 17.—Tiger Flowers, Atlanta Negro middleweight, was matched today for a ten-round fight February 26 with Johnny Wilson.

Flowers next will appear at Boston January 27, when he is scheduled to box ten rounds with Tommy Robson. He is matched with Jamaica Kid for a 12 round contest at Dayton, Ohio, February 4.

Flowers left here for Atlanta this afternoon for a short visit to his family, after which he will return here and go into training for his bout with Robson.

Cancels Flowers Bout.

Newark, N. J., Jan. 17.—A twelve round bout between Ted Moore and Tiger Flowers which was scheduled to be held at Newark armory February 2 was cancelled today by Culpin one of the promoters. Culpin said the cancellation was decided upon following the knockout defeat of Flowers at the hands of Jack Delaney in New York last night.

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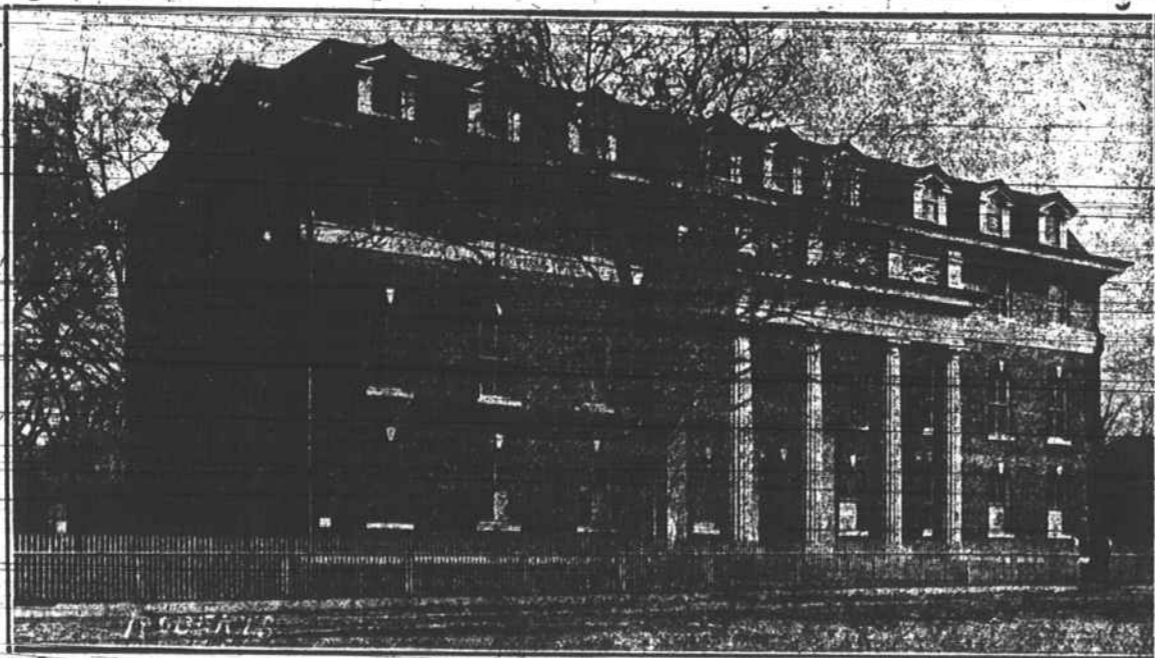
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
