

## EX-POLICEMAN MURDERS A COLORED MAN

CITY COUNCIL VOTES  
\$1000.00 TO DEFEND

Ex-Policeman Who Murdered  
A Negro Man

\$3000 SPENT IN SEVERAL COURTS

By the Father of the Murdered Man to  
Apprehend Guilty Parties—The Ex-  
Policeman Convicted and Sentenced

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, 69 Fifth Avenue, New York City, today received a report from Palm Beach, Florida, stating that after the conviction and sentence of a white ex-policeman to twenty years in jail for murdering a colored boy, the City Council of Palm Beach went to the unheard of length of appropriating \$1,000 of city funds for the purpose of assuring the ex-policeman an appeal and a new trial.

The young colored man, Henry Speed, Jr., was shot some months ago by Fred Frantz, the former white policeman, and

died of his wound within 48 hours. The father of the colored boy left no stone unturned to bring the murderer to justice and it is said the various trials cost not less than \$3,000. A correspondent in Florida of the N. A. A. C. P. writes:

"The evidence submitted to the consideration of the jury must have been so convincing and damaging that they brought in a verdict of guilty against the WHITE murderer of a Negro!

PUBLISHES RULES

Fisk's Head Issue Propaganda Pamphlet

AND "THE RULES"—50 PAGES

The Pamphlet Containing Letters of Endorsement From Every State in The South

Nashville, Tenn., March.—A fifty-page pamphlet containing letters of endorsement from every state in the south endorsing the stand of President Fayette McKenzie in the recent outbreak at Fisk university has just been issued by the university authorities. All of these letters are purported to be from colored persons and are claimed in solid backing of the president's attitude.

Published with the letters are the following rules and regulations of the school which were the source of discontent among the students:

"No visitors may be received on Sunday except by permission of the dean of women.

"No callers may be entertained in the bedroom except by permission of her hostess.

"Shoes with French heels or other high heels may not be used for day wear, either upon the campus or upon the street. For evening no slipper or pump with a heel more than one and half inches is allowed.

"The tailored suit must be of dark blue or black. It must be necessarily plain, free from trimmings of a different color. It may, however, have a collar and cuffs of fur. It should be of wool, not of silk or velvet.

"Dress—A simple tailored woolen dress of dark blue or black, may be worn with a dark coat of blue, black or brown. The dress must be without colored trimming. Buttons must not be used except of the same tone of the dress.

"Hat—A dark blue or black hat, velvet, felt or satin, plainly trimmed, is required. On the hat there must be no colored trimming, of any kind; no gold, silver or tinsel braid.

"No low-necked dress or dress without sleeves is allowed.

"Spring uniform—Dark blue or black suit without color may be worn, or a simple dark blue or black dress of taffeta or similar material. These dresses must be self-trimmed and have sleeves below the elbow.

"Separate coats cannot be worn for uniform.

"Very thin hose cannot be worn at any time.

"Parents are asked not to permit students to bring with them to the school expensive jewelry or heirlooms of any kind. Neither should they be

Extradition of a colored man, Murray Bonner, from West Virginia to Georgia has been prevented by the local National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, according to the Capital City News, of Charleston.

Bonner had been arrested and was serving 14 days for stealing a ride on the Baltimore & Ohio freight. A special B. & O. officer then identified Bonner as one Lincoln Johnson, wanted for alleged murder in Hart County, Georgia. Bonner protested his innocence and said he had been working at Lindale, W. New York, N. Y., Mch.—F. Morris Murray, president of Murray Brothers Printing Company, president of the Washington Tribune Publishing Co., and secretary of the Crescent Amusement Company, the concern that operates the Dunbar theatre in Washington, D. C., has been selected by the Universal Development and Loan company as manager of Suburban Park, the hundred-acre amusement resort they own in the District of Columbia.

Mr. Murray's selection came as a surprise to him and the officials of the company have given him a two-year contract so that he may have ample time to secure effective results with a project that has suffered considerably from lack of proper management.

They have long been interested in amusement enterprises and once operated quite a chain of film theatres. The dance casino conducted on the top floor of the building that houses their printing plant is a model of its kind, and a highly profitable business in itself.

The park is a well laid out

property just far enough out of the city to provide an interesting ride for its patrons. It is provided with a scenic railway, dolgem, aerial swing, merry-go-round, a theater, an unusually large dance pavilion, and a number of concession stands booths. Its fifth season will be opened early in May.
