REV. H. M. MOORE, A. B., B. D., D. D., CALLED TO CHARLOTTE, N. C. PROMINENT COLUMBIA PASTOR GOES TO THE EBENEZER BAPTIST CHURCH, RESIGNED THE PASTORATE OF 2ND CALVARY SUNDAY NIGHT TO LEAVE IN MAY.

Like a thunder-bolt from the clear sky, came the resignation of the Rev. Henry M. Moore, A. B., B. D., D. D., the highly esteemed and much honored pastor of the Second Calvary Baptist Church of this city last Sunday night.

The resignation is to take effect the last of May, and the Rev. Dr. Moore will then take up the pastorate of the Ebenezer Baptist Church, Charlotte, N. C.

The Ebenezer Baptist Church is said to be one of the largest and the most prosperous congregations in the entire state of North Carolina.

The Rev. H. M. Moore was born in Greenwood, S. C., 49 years ago. At an early age he attended the "old field school." When he had reached his majority he saw the need of education. He then entered the Deaver Normal School at Greenwood, S. C. where he studied for three years. He afterwards matriculated at Benedict College in this city, where he studied and labored for 9 years, during which time he finished the L. I. College and Theological course, with the degree of A. B. and B. D., the degree of D. D. having been conferred later because of his meritorious work in the state.

Dr. Moore has continuously been engaged in the pastorate for the last 20 years. He has successfully pastored the following churches:

Mt. Moriah, Spartanburg; St. Paul, at Anderson, the churches at Belton, Abbeville and Honea Path and here in Columbia.

In 1907, the same year Dr. Moore finished the college course at Benedict College here, he married Miss Mattie L. Henry of Wainsboro, S. C., 6-13. The sermon was very much en-

also a graduate of Benedict college, and one of South Carolina's best girls.

The Rev. Mr. Moore has been the honored and acceptable president of the Baptist State Sunday School and B. Y. P. U. Convention ever since its organization 19 years ago.

Dr. Moore was among the original "24" trustees who founded Morris College in this state, and has been one of its outspoken champions ever since.

He is also the author of a book of fiction called "Raymond," which is the picture of a poor boy's struggle up the rugged road of life. The Dr. is now working on another book, when finished, will be an invaluable asset to the ministry. It will be known as "Abraham A Man-Faith."

Dr. Moore was the founder and the president of the Union High School at Belton, S. C. For three years he presided over this important school, and at the same time pastored three churches.

South Carolina sustains an irreplaceable loss in the giving up of one of her favorite sons to the brotherhood of the Old North State, and Columbia and Second Calvary in particular. Bro. Moore is universally loved by all who know him here. He is affable, level-headed, a man of peace, a great gospel preacher, a worthy friend and withal a Christian gentleman.

The Ebenezer Church has had some worthy divines to shape her destiny, she has had none more worthy than our friend, and esteemed Christian brother, Henry M. Moore, A. B., B. D. and D. D.

Newberry County Teachers' Assn.

The Newberry County Teachers' Association met in its monthly meeting Saturday, March 7, 1925, at 11:40 a. m., with its president, Mr. U. S. Gallman, in the chair. The meeting was opened by singing "Peace Be Still." Prayer by Prof. R. F. Gladden, then singing, "It's Me, O Lord."

Subject for discussion: "Why only five per cent. of the Negro boys and girls receive diplomas." The teachers and friends entered the discussion readily, giving many causes and suggesting many remedies on raising this percentage. I am sure if more parents had been present and would execute the remedies presented, there would be no cause for this delinquency.

Mr. E. H. Aull, the county superintendent, was present and made a very appropriate and inspiring talk. He used for a subject Psalm 133: Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity. He illustrated how much unity the lower animals exercise toward each other, and yet man, the ruler over all animals, seems to forget and fails to live in unity. He was very uplifted over the enthusiastic spirit of the Rosenwald Idea in our county. Ten (10) schools have been built and five (5) underway.

Two other counties were represented. Each county's representative gave the association short and encouraging talks. We gladly welcome visitors.

Mr. U. S. Gallman, the county supervisor, exhibited some industrial and manual art work. Every article shown was made from material that had been thrown away, such as pieces of goods, boxes, rough plank and paste board. They were very, very useful pieces of work.
