

THE PARTIAL ECLIPSE OF TIGER FLOWERS.

New York, N. Y., Mch.—Jack Delaney, the Bridgeport, Conn., scientific mauler, took Tiger Flowers, the Georgai sensation, in town again Thursday night, administering a knockout in the fourth round. Flowers, as is his wont, carried the battle to Delaney, but he failed to fluster the white battler and was knocked out three times in the final period.

This defeat, following so close upon the two-round knockout scored by Delaney, a month ago, puts something of a crimp in the Tiger's championship aspirations. So far Delaney has been the only one of his weight to get the Tiger's goat. Flowers met the middleweight champion, Harry Greb, in Ohio last year and whipped him to a frazzle. He has beaten up other men who have made it hot for Delaney. Still, as long as the French-Canadian stands in the way, the Georgia boy will have to be content to take second.

He is far from through, however. He is one of the best-liked fighters in the game, always giving the fans a run for their money and he will continue to beat them all up with the exception of his one possible nemesis. It would be interesting now to see Flowers and Slattery, who has twice beaten Delaney, hook up.

Incidentally, a pile of the success that has come to the Tiger has been because of the sterling work of his manager, Walk Miller. One is forced to think of what a manager of Miller's calibre might have meant to Harry Wills. The big heavyweight has been whining around for a chance, living a decent life, and steadily declining in popularity. Flowers has been fighting, making money and even driving bargains. For his last knockout at the hands of Delaney, he received two and a half per cent more than he did for the first. That was Miller's work. It ought to mean something to Paddy Mullins. If Wills is as good as the folks think he is, he should be trotted out and kept in action, against anybody and everybody.

TELLS OF CATHOLIC WORK FOR NEGROES IN SOUTH.

Philadelphia, Pa., March.—Description of the work being done for the Negroes by the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament in their missions in the South was given Sunday afternoon by Mother Francis Xavier, of St. Elizabeth's Convent, at the headquarters of the Knights of Columbus, No. 512 Spruce street.

Mother Francis Xavier showed pictures of the schools in the South where the sisters of her order give an elementary and practical education to thousands of neglected colored children, training them not only in morals but along lines which fit them to earn a livelihood.

In addition to these schools the pictures also showed some fine buildings, where the children are given a high school education. The purpose of the lecture was to inspire an interest in the work of the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament and to procure funds and workers for the establishment of additional mission schools. Mother Francis Xavier will later give a lecture on the work of the sisters among the Indians.

The Order Sister of the Blessed Sacrament was founded about 30 years ago by Miss Katherine Drexel, now Mother Katherine, daughter of the late Francis Drexel, the well-known baker of this city. Mother Katherine has devoted her order to work among the Indians and Negroes. The order now numbers several hundred sisters.

VIRGIN ISLANDERS DEMAND GOVERNOR EXPLAIN INSULT.

New York, N. Y., March.—Governor Phillip Williams of the Virgin Islands has been called on by the Colonial Council, the native legislature, to explain statements alleged to have been made by Police Chief M. J. Nolan of St. Thomas that "these niggers here don't want law and order." According to information received by the American Civil Liberties Union, the popular demand for the removal of Nolan has been ignored by the naval administration.

The Colonial Council has also passed a resolution demanding a thorough investigation of the St. Thomas police force and another calling for an examination of the franchise law. An amendment to the code of laws making jury trials mandatory instead of optional with the judge has been taken up for passage.

All of the resolutions were introduced by Rothschild Francis, editor of the Virgin Islands, emancipator, recently sentenced to thirty days on a charge of criminal libel for criticising the police. He was tried before Judge Washington Williams without a jury. His appeal to higher courts is being handled by the Civil Liberties Union, which has been campaigning for a permanent form of civil government for the islands.

TO FREE THOUSANDS OF SLAVES.

New York, N. Y., March.—The announcement a short while ago, a short while after the exposure of the sensational relations between an eastern prince and a lovely English woman, of the release from slavery of more than 51,000 human souls in the Indian province of Nepal, was

received with great surprise. This astonishment was due, in large measure, to the fact that these slaves were tributary to Great Britain.

The maharajah of Nepal has issued a decree for the abolition of slavery and declined to accept any proposals to change his decision.

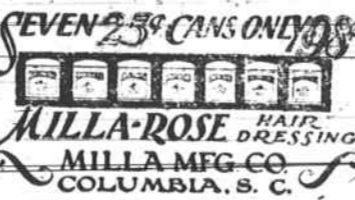
