Miss Mayme Whitmore of St. Matthews, S. C., was the guest of the Misses Addie and Julia M. Thomas, during the week-end.

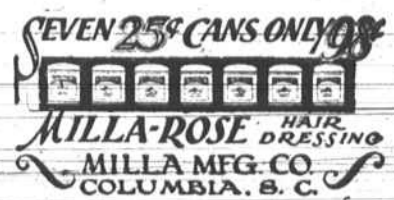
We notice with quite a degree of admiration that Dr. Elmer Pickett and Miss Cole of Boston, Mass., are finding each others company rather agreeable.
