Palm Sunday, April 5th, at St. Luke's Episcopal Church (West Hampton St.) was fittingly celebrated. The Rev. S. W. Grice, War-

den of the Bishop Payne's Divinity School, Petersburg, Virginia was the celebrant at the Holy Communion at the 11:15 a. m. service, assisted by Mr. N. E. Lewis, Lay Leader.

The true spirit of the day was vividly noticeable upon entering the church. The altar was profusely decorated with palms and flowers daintily arranged behind a mass of brilliantly lighted candles. There was a large and eager congregation present. When the hour of worship arrived the cross bearer was seen to enter the church with the cross appropriately caressed with palms. Following him was the immaculately vested choir and clergy, singing: Hymn 90. The congregation reverently rose and heartily joined in the singing.

Father Grice conducted the service following in a very beautiful and churchly manner. He preached an excellent sermon and, indeed, one appropriate for the day which was thoroughly enjoyed by all. A record number partook of the Holy Communion. "The Palms" was sung for the offertory; and after the impressive custom of dispensing of palms, all went away feeling wonderfully blessed, after singing the recessional hymn. At the 4 p. m. Sunday School Service where 90 per cent of its students were present, Mr. R. S. Roberts addressed the body in commemoration of Jesus Christ's Triumphal Entry and its true meaning in regards to "Church Militancy."

Father Grice then followed with an address on: "Personal Service," which was enjoyed by all. Mr. Fabrice Paul is the live and energetic Superintendent of the Sunday School.

At the 5 p. m. Service a special programme was rendered which was participated in by loyal friends of the Sidney Park C. M. E.; Second Calvary Baptist; Ladson Presbyterian and Metropolitan A. M. E. Churches, and an appreciative audience composed of nearly every church in the city both white and colored.

Long before the minute of service arrived the pews were filled to overflowing.

After the Processional Hymn: "All Glory Lord and Honor," was sung. And the order of Evening Prayer was so pleasingly conducted by Father Grice, all joined in hymn: "Softly now the Light of Day." After devotions, a beautiful selection was sung by Sidney Park C. M. E. Junior choir. This was followed by a touching violin solo by the well known artist Miss Blanche Singleton, accompanied by Miss Farrabell McWhorter, of Spartanburg. Miss Daisy Roach, one of Columbia's noted singers then favored the audience with a beautiful solo, Miss Alma Bailey then followed with a piano solo. She showed excellent skill. Mrs. H. N. Vincent and Mr. Henry Allen sang beautiful solos harmonizing nicely with the occasion; as also did Master Edward Kyer with a violin solo, accompanied by Miss Genevieve Kyer: Master Pinckney Gatten with his violin, accompanied by Master LeRoy Hardy, saxophone played nicely and received much comment especially on account of the tender age of the former. Rev. Grice then delivered a powerful address which was enjoyed by all. The "Palms" was sung by the choir, and after the offering was taken up, and the dispensing of palm branches, all joined in the recessional hymn: "Ride on Ride on in Majesty." The glorious services for the eventful day had come to a close.
