Orangeburg, S. C., April 4—Allen University of Columbia, S. C., fresh from her victories of the week before swooped down on Orangeburg to meet the two Colleges here in a series of three games, and took two of her three scheduled. The first from State College by a score of 7 to 3. The second from Claflin by a score of 12 to 7. The final game with Claflin, the tide turned and Allen was only able to save herself from a shut out by making two scores in the sixth inning. Claflin took this game by a score of 6 to 2.

Allen's first game with State College was won because of both poor defense and offense on the part of State College. Hopkins, Ace pitcher of State College, pitched a good game but did not receive the support of his teammates. While Tyler of Allen had everything that the State College batters could not see.

Claflin met Allen in the second game of the series and lost by poor defensive playing. Claflin's boys could hit but were not able to support Marshall, pitching for Claflin. Heyward tossed for Allen in this fray and by good support, worked through the whole nine innings.

In the final game of the series Knight was summoned to the mound for Claflin and Blake to do the receiving. Reed was sent to the mound for Allen while Swinton again took his turn behind the bat.

First inning Allen failed to score. Claflin threatened to score when Byrd walked and stole second and Blake hit a high fly which muffed Blake safe at second and the chance for scoring ceased, when Singleton fanned. Allen failed to score in her half of the second. Holmes the first man up for Claflin received a base on balls and scored on Taylor's triple. The scoring ceased until the fourth when Claflin after Allen's futile attempt to score put across three runs.

The fifth inning was calm on both sides, but in the first half of the sixth, Allen managed to get two men on base and scored a minute later, when Singleton misjudged a drive. Claflin took her half of the sixth and by a rally put across two more tallies. The game ended Claflin 6, Allen 2.
