ALLEN DEFEATS STATE.

Orangeburg, S. C., April 3.—In a game marked by the effective pitching of Tyler (an ex-Statite) and numerous errors on the part of the Garnet and Blue infield, State College was defeated by Allen University of Columbia here to-day, 7 to 3.

Cannon Ball Hopkins was on the mound for the A. & M. aggregation, and although he allowed more hits than his opponent, the big fellow was superb in the pinches. Errors proved his undoing.

Diggs, the midget third sacker, for State, and the star second sacker for Allen, electrified the vast crowd by several spectacular stops of difficult grounders and drives and lightning throws to first sack.

WILLS WANTS TO FIGHT GIBBONS.

New York, N. Y., April.—Harry Wills, the colored heavyweight challenger, was quoted Thursday as declaring that Paddy Mullins, his manager, had made a mistake in falling to sign for a bout with Tom Gibbons when offered a big guarantee by promoters of the milk fund show.

"Certainly, I want to fight Gibbons," Wills said, when asked about his stand in the controversy. "I want to fight anybody they can get for me, I realize that Mullins has placed me in a bad light, but what can I do about it? He is my manager and I have got to do what he says."

MOREHOUSE SWAMPS BENEDICT

SOUTH CAROLINA STATE COLLEGE HOLDS MOREHOUSE.

Orangeburg, S. C., April 10.—Morehouse College met the State College Warriors in desperate battle here to-day and by a terrific circuit wallop of Guy Rogers was able to win the game, Morehouse 2, State College 1.

Hopkins was sent in to do the tossing for State, while June did the receiving. Coach Harvey elected Marlin for his pitcher and Williams as catcher. Both pitchers showed good form and control; Marlin having the edge by striking out eleven and allowing only three hits while Hopkins struck out four and allowed seven hits.

Until the last half of the eighth it looked like a shut out for State, but Hopkins, himself first man up, would not bear the ignoring of this, got on base by laying down a bunt on his third strike, stole second, was passed to third on a wild throw and came in home for the first and only tally that State College through determined effort was able to make. The game ended in the ninth after another attempt by State College to overcome the lead of Morehouse.

LEE ANDERSON WINS.

Philadelphia, Pa., April.—Lee Anderson, the Negro light-heavy-weight, of Boston, who, while making his home in this city, until his wife recovers from her illness, won from Tex McEwen white, of Canada, in the sixth round of a ten-round bout at the Arena Monday night.

White McEwen showed wonderful gameness, and carried the fight to Anderson in every round while his strength lasted. It was evident after the first round that McEwen was over-matched, although he weighed 176 1-2 pounds.

Tex seemed to be faster on his feet than Anderson, but the man from Boston punches were

harder and from the second round, when Anderson started the blood flowing from McEwen's nose up till the time that the bout was stopped in the sixth, it was plain that it was only a question of time till the terrific punches of Anderson would play out McEwen. When the Canadian was so helpless in the sixth that he could not get his hands up to defend himself, and was completely at the mercy of Anderson, Referee Nolan stopped the uneven contest, although McEwen protested and wanted to continue.

DEPARTMENT OF LABOR HAS DISMISSED DR. PLECKER COMPLAINED OF BY N. A. A. C. P.

(By The N. A. A. C. P.) The U. S. Department of Labor has dismissed from its service Dr. A. W. Plecker of Richmond, Va., concerning whose anti-Negro pamphlets distributed at the expense of the government, complaint was made to Washington by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. The N. A. A. C. P. has received a letter from Arthur E. Cook, Assistant to the Secretary of Labor, confirming the dismissal.
