In fact the colored Baptists of Orangeburg have not seen the State Convention for thirty-two years. It has been 32 years since we assembled there.

Dr. J. C. Dunbar, the big gun from the old historic Morris Street Baptist church was there greeting the brethren, his favorite song is: "I'm so glad that trouble don't last always."

The brethren at Orangeburg, stayed in the house better than we have seen in the last twenty four years. You saw none of the usual standing around smoking cigars, and indulging in idle gossip. A new spirit of spiritual consciousness has seized the brethren.
