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ILLINOIS LEGISLATURE DE-

FEATS KLAN BILL

(For the Associated Negro Press.)

Springfield, Ill., June—The anti-Ku Klux Klan bill introduced in this session of the legislature by Representative William E. King, one of Chicago's colored law makers was defeated by the house last Thursday on a vote

whose record of 58 for and 63 against gave little indication of the heated fight which the measure caused. The bill which would have required all secret organizations to submit their membership lists to the Secretary of State did not mention the Ku Klux Klan by name but the entire state recognized that the

klan was the target and in his final forceful appeal King declared that the bill was aimed at the klan alone. Party lines were broken, factionalism was forgotten and men lost sight of race in the hubbub which ensued as the final vote was taken. Former Speaker Shanahan, the most popular man in the house, rose from his sick bed and in his first speech of the session asked that the measure be defeated although he was a Catholic. He said "I belong to a number of the secret organizations which have been mentioned here. I am a Catholic. I wish my Catholic, my Negro and my Jewish friends would forget there is such a thing as the klan.

I have been here longer and I have lived longer than most of you. I have seen these narrow

organizations come and go, and you will see this one go after

some smart wise fellow gets all

there is to get out of it. Why

dignify them?" His plea carried much weight. Although

the bill was defeated King won

acclaim for the splendid fight

which he made on the measure

and the anti-klan group is claiming

a moral victory.

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
