MINISTER DEMANDS WHIPPING POST

New York, July—Whippings for habitual criminals and capital punishment for murderers as a crime deterrent throughout the country were urged by the Rev. Charles Hillman Fountain, white Baptist minister of Plainfield, N. J., in a sermon delivered at the opening of the West Side Religious Forum here. "Modernism," he said, "looks upon sin as a disease rather than a guilt. This influence is seen in pampering the criminal class, sending offenders to nice prisons to be well fed and entertained. If the whipping post could be established it would have a beneficial effect in securing the safety of society."
