10th CALVARY BAND AT BUSINESS LEAGUE MT'NG

Tulsa, Okla., July—The entertainment committee of the Tulsa Negro Business League has through the instrumentality of the Senators Harrold and Pine, just completed arrangements with the War Department for the 10th Cavalry Band to furnish music for the entertainment of the National Negro Business League, which meets here August 19-20-21.

Tulsa expects to entertain the National Negro Business League in grand style.

Arrangements have been completed with the Oklahoma Union Railway Company by which all visitors may have an opportunity to see the second largest park in the United States, the Mohawk Park. The large sight-seeing cars will leave Booker Washington High School grounds each day during the entire session of the League, 9 A. M., 2 P. M., and 4 P. M. for a round trip, a distance of 22 miles, for the small sum of One Dollar for the round trip, conditioned upon their filling the car for each trip.
